## REEVE MILLWARD VICTOR IN BRONTE

Bronte voters upheld the policies of Reeve Thomas Millward as they swept him back into office by a 724 to 277 majority over his opponent, George MacLeod.

Councillor Charles Livingstone was returned with 365 votes. A newcomer Francis Wright, led the polls with 373; another newcomer, George Williams, garnered 304 and Kenneth Lewis, the fourth man to council, 290.

Councillor John Davidson, accounted for only 139 votes; Roy W. Richardson obtained 38, Leonard Couke, 163, Douglas R. Watt, 214 and Ernest Hurley, 82.

In the race for public school trustees, incumbent Mrs. Dorothy Irvine, led the polls with 337 votes. Richard Lee, a newcomer, ran up a total of 320. Another newcomer, Igor Melles, was the third member elected with 246 votes. Keith Wyatt fell short with 178 and Mrs. Leonard Couke with 210.

Chairman Ernest C. Taylor of the Public Utilities Commission was returned to office.

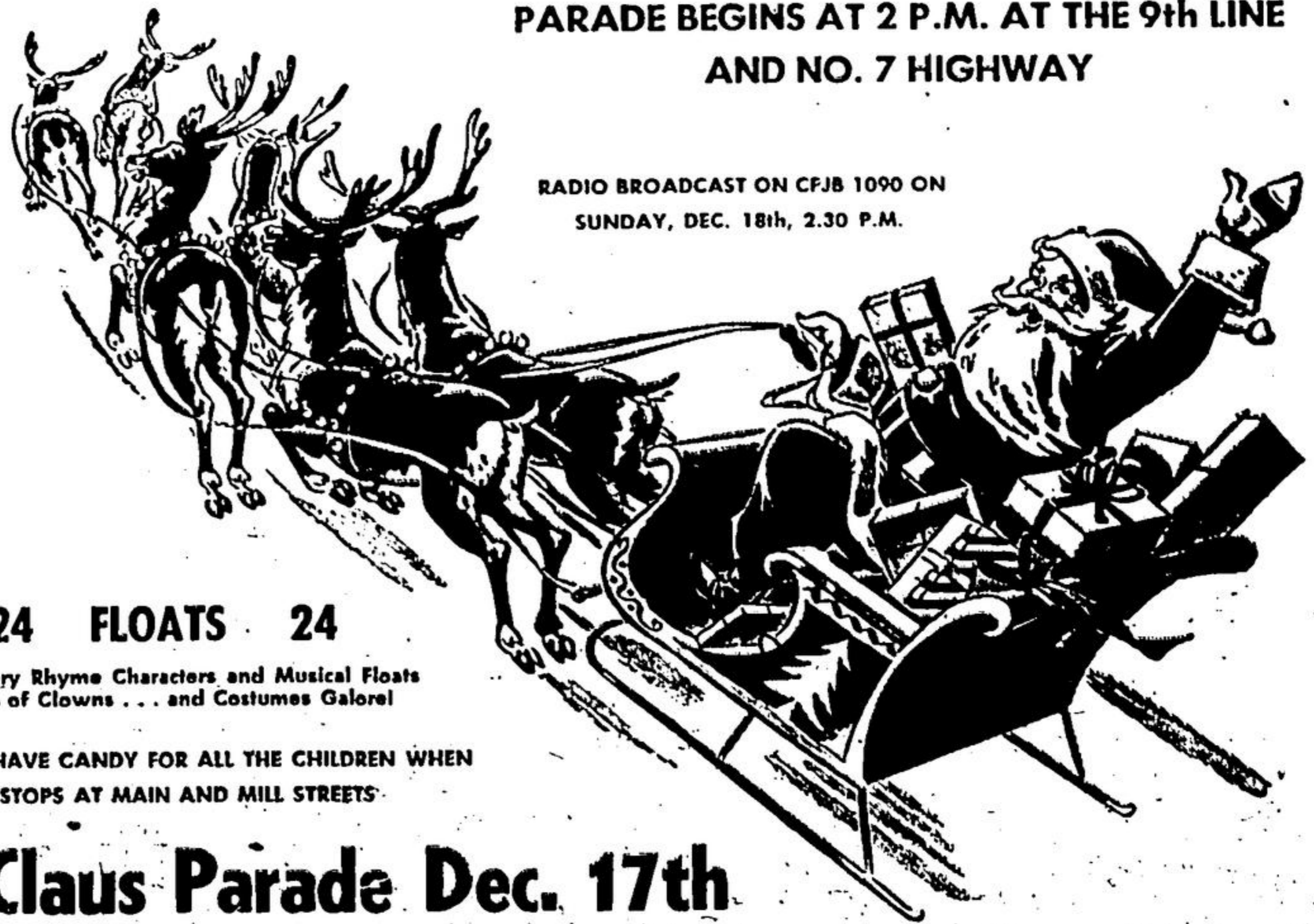
