Council Thanks Reeve As Presiding Officer

Thanks to retiring Reeve Wilfrid Bird was expressed by Esquesing councillors at their closing meeting last Thursday at Stewarttown, when he was asked to vacate the chair and Deputy Reeve Walter Latham presided briefly.

Council members, by motion, thanked Mr. Bird for the courteous and impartial manner in which he had presided over meetings and conducted township business.

Mr. Bird, who has been reeve for two years, is being succeeded in this office by Mr. Latham next year, but will continue as a council member by virtue of his acclamation as a councillor.

Award Boiler Contract For Brampton Hospital

Contracts were let last week for the extension of the existing boiler room and the addition of a third boiler at Peel Memorial Hospital, in Brampton.

The management committee was forced to take this first step in its expansion programme immediately because of the acute situation prevailing at the present time.

As a result of the continued overcrowding of the 78-bed hospital, and the consequent inadequacy of the present supply of essential steam and hot water, it was felt by the Board that this important action could not safely be delayed any longer.

The total cost of the extension will be approximately \$38,000 and the Board is hopeful of financing this project from the money it received from the sale of the Trueman Street property last year and the special Rehabilitation grant from the Provincial government.

Heatley Construction Company, of Brampton, was awarded the contract for the building. Francis Mankin and Co. Ltd., Toronto, will erect the special 80 foot radial chimney. J. Wiggins and Son, Ltd., of Toronto, will supply and install the new boiler and A. R. King of Brampton will do the necessary electrical work. John B. Parkin Associates are the architects. Excavation will be started this week and the work completed as rapidly as possible.

The size of the addition is 27' x 55' and the new portion will have sufficient area to accommodate the necessary boiler units required when the overall expansion programme is developed, as well as space for auxiliary power and light unit so urgently needed in emergencies when the hydro service is interrupted.

The Board's property committee is at present investigating this matter further in the hope that the installation will be made as necessary.

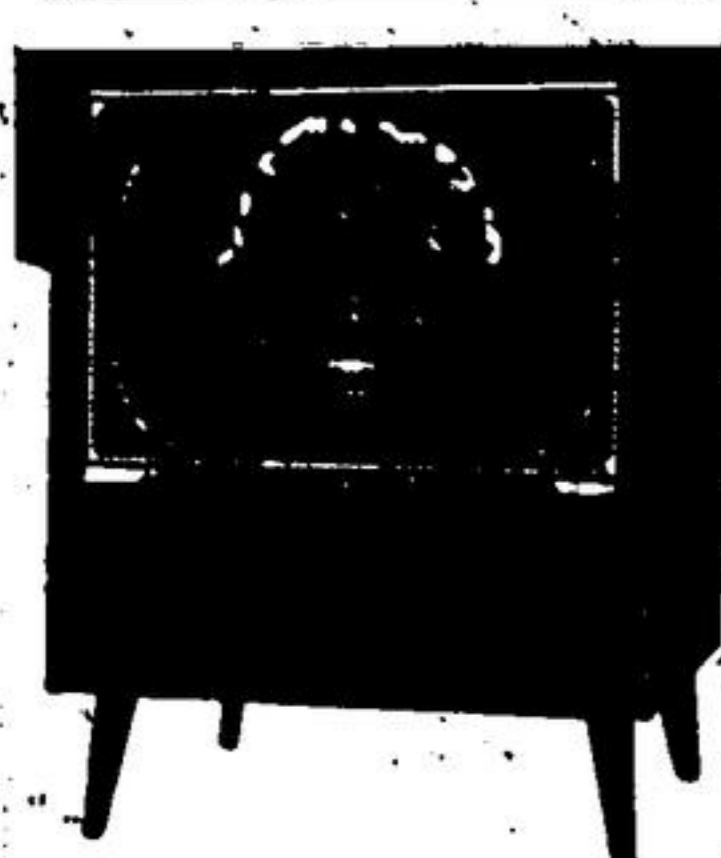

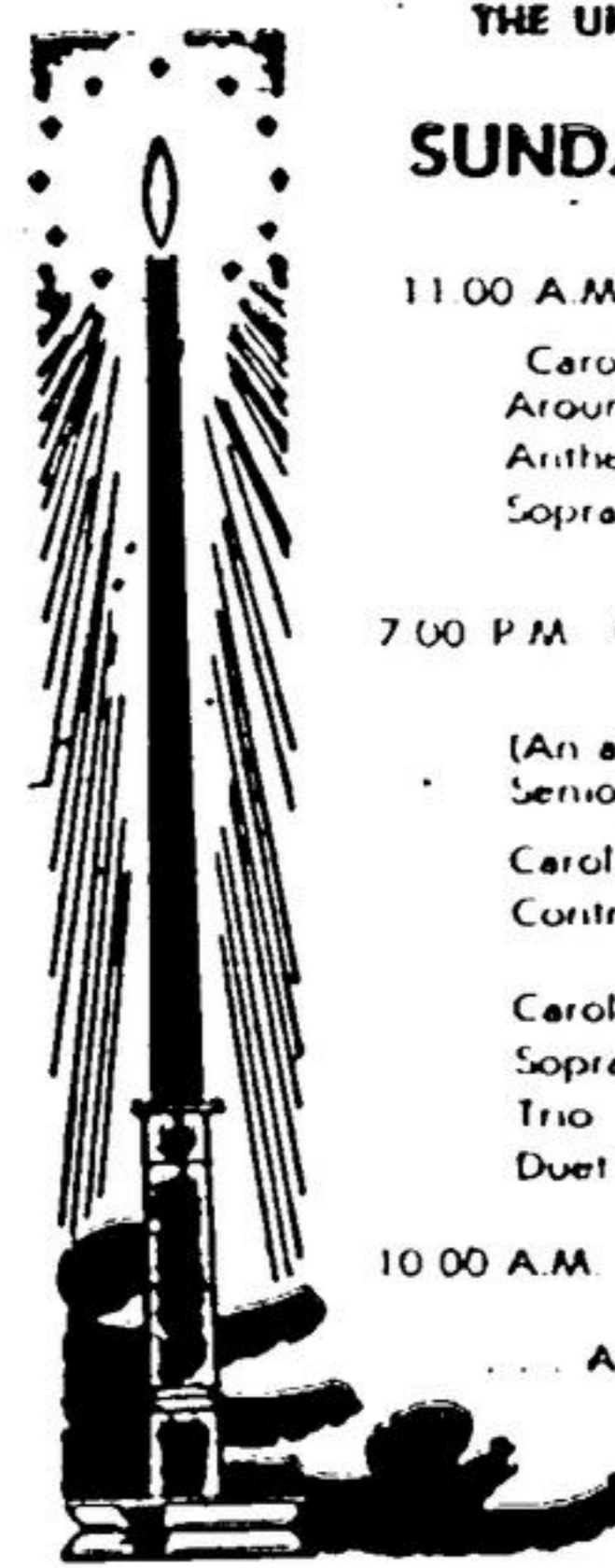
