NOTICE OF closing and stopping  
up certain portions of the original al-  
lowances for road (and certain di-  
visions thereof) between Lots 15 and  
16 in the 9th Concession of the Town-  
ship of Esqueusing, and between Lots  
15 and 16 in the 10th Concession of  
the Township of Esqueusing, all now  
in the Town of Georgetown, in the

the conveyance of the portion so stop-

TAKE NOTICE that the Municipal  
Council of the Town of Georgetown  
proposed to pass a By-law to close and  
stop up certain portions of the ori-  
ginal allowances for road (and certain  
divisions thereof) between Lots 15  
and 16 in the 9th Concession of the  
Township of Esqueusing, and between  
Lots 15 and 16 in the 10th Conces-  
sion of the Township of Esqueusing, all  
now in the Town of Georgetown, in  
the County of Halton — being those  
certain parcels or tracts of lands  
and premises situate, lying and being  
in the Town of Georgetown (formerly  
in the Township of Esqueusing), in the  
County of Halton, more particularly  
described as follows, that is to say:

FIRSTLY: Those parts (shown be-  
tween broken lines on the registered  
Plan hereinafter referred to) of Lots  
7, 33, 36, 37, 61, 62, 74, 75 and 76, and  
of Blocks C and G, according to a  
Plan of Subdivision filed in the Reg-  
istry Office for the Registry Division  
of the County of Halton as Number  
617, lying within the boundaries of the  
original allowance for road between  
Township Lots 15 and 16 in the 10th  
Concession of the Township of Es-  
queusing.

SECONDLY: Those parts (shown be-  
tween broken lines on the registered  
plan hereinafter referred to) of Lots  
231, 232, 233, 398, 399, 407, 408, 409,  
410 and 411 according to a Plan of  
Subdivision filed in the Registry Of-  
fice for the Registry Division of the  
County of Halton as Number 618 lying  
within the boundaries of the original  
allowance for road between Township  
Lots 15 and 16 in the 9th Concession  
of the Township of Esqueusing.

THIRDLY: That part (shown be-  
tween broken lines on the registered  
Plan hereinafter referred to) of Lot  
398, according to a Plan of Subdivi-  
sion filed in the Registry Office for  
the Registry Division of the County  
of Halton as Number 618, lying within  
the boundaries of the diversion of the  
original allowance for road between  
Township Lots 15 and 16 in the 9th  
Concession of the Township of Es-  
queusing the said diversion having  
been created in or about the year 1880  
by that certain Instrument registered  
in the said Registry Office as Instru-  
ment Number 3241, for the Twp. of  
Esqueusing.

FOURTHLY: That part of the origin-  
al allowance for road between Twp.  
Lots 15 and 16 in the 9th Concession  
of the Township of Esqueusing lying  
to the south-west of the land laid out  
by a Plan of Subdivision filed in the

FIFTHLY: That part of Township  
Lot 16 in the 9th Concession of the  
Township of Esqueusing comprising the  
diversion of the original allowance for  
road between Township Lots 15 and  
16 in the 9th Concession lying to the  
west of the lands laid out by a Plan  
of Subdivision filed in the Registry  
Office for the Registry Division of the  
County of Halton as Number 618, the  
said diversion having been created in  
or about the year 1880 in the said Reg-  
istry Office as Instrument Number  
3241 for the Township of Esqueusing;

SIXTHLY: That part of Town-  
ship Lot 15 in the 9th Concession of  
the Township of Esqueusing being  
composed of the diversion of the ori-  
ginal allowance for road between  
Township Lots 15 and 16 in the 9th  
Concession of the Township of Es-  
queusing, the said diversion having  
been created in or about the year  
1880 by that certain Instrument reg-  
istered in the Registry Office for the  
Registry Division of the County of  
Halton as Instrument Number 3242  
for the Township of Esqueusing;

And to authorize the conveyance of  
the portions so stopped up to the  
adjoining owners:  
The said By-law will be dealt with  
at a meeting of the Council to be held  
for the purpose of considering the  
said By-law on Monday, the 6th day  
of February, 1966, at the hour of 8  
o'clock in the evening at the Muni-  
cipal Office, Georgetown, Ont.

**Three Towns Discuss  
Hospital Improvements**

Putting new life into hospitals as  
well as into patients was the thought  
behind a three-way conference held in  
Brampton on Wednesday, December  
7th attended by doctors and hospital  
representatives of Brampton, Geor-  
getown and Milton. A recommendation  
was made by Dr. H. Hoyle Campbell  
that an advisory committee be estab-  
lished to study ways and means of in-  
tegrating hospitals into compact reg-  
ional networks. Representatives from  
hospitals in a given district could  
plan for new and existing hospitals to  
pool resources and services. For ex-  
ample, one radiologist and one pathol-  
ogist, and one bacteriologist could  
serve three or four hospitals such as  
those of the towns mentioned. Also,  
laundry installations could be reduced  
by making one plant serve the three  
hospitals.

Another economy would be ef-  
fected, suggested Dr. Campbell, by not  
allowing chronic cases to congest hos-  
pital space needed for patients under  
active treatment. It often happens  
that urgent surgery cases must, after  
operations, be left in corridors for  
lack of suitable wards. Planning along  
new, radical lines would bring a solu-  
tion to this and other problems such  
as having a wing for convalescents,  
another for geriatrics and a further  
one for diagnostic services. It was  
thought that there should be three  
reserve beds for each active bed in  
order to keep a hospital functioning  
smoothly.

Dr. Hoyle Campbell is the Cana-  
dian Medical Association's representa-  
tive on the National Advisory Board for  
the Rehabilitation of Disabled Per-  
sons. Other officials present at the  
meeting were Dr. C. K. Stevenson,  
Bruce MacNah, and John S. Wright,  
(president), of Milton District Hospi-  
tal with John D. Ord, John A. Gunn  
and George E. Sivill (chairman) of  
Georgetown Hospital Committee and  
C. V. Charters, chairman of Peel Mem-  
orial Hospital Board, Brampton.
