#### Half Million Net For United Co-Operatives

"This is the first time in its history that United Co-Operatives of Ontario netted half a million dollars," J. E. Newhey of Woodstock, Ontario, and president of UCO told delegates of the 60,000 farmer-member organization at its annual meeting held December 12th and 13th at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto.

Some 500 delegates from over 150 cooperatives located throughout Ontario attended the two day meeting. Net earnings for the year ended September 30, 1955, totalled \$504,875. This represented an increase of \$200,-

817 over the 1954 earnings of \$304,-A record sales volume of \$50,322,-972 for the year was reported by Hugh Bailey, general manager of the UCO. Last year's sales totalled \$49,-

817,362 and was \$505,610 under the 1955 record. Patronage returns for the year totalled \$397,481 of which cooperatives will receive \$349,634 in the common shares, while non-members wil receive \$47,848 in cash. Patronage returns for 1954 totalled \$207,199.

Highlights of the president's and the general manager's reports follow: The UCO Thamesville fertilizer plant following a warehouse addition attained a record output of 16,883 tons during 1955. Current improvements to equipment will further in-

crease the efficiency of this plant. Distribution of petroleum during the past twelve months amounted to in excess of 10 million gallons, compared with 8 million in 1954. The development of propane as a domestic heating and tractor fuel is currently occupying the attention of UCO.

A grain marketing division with offices in Chatham was commenced in September to purchase Ontario grains from local cooperatives and other country elevators, and to sell grains to the processing, milling and export trades. The feasibility of building a terminal elevator, accessible to water transportation for conditioning, storing and elevating grains is now being studied.

The volume handled in the livestock division represented approximately one third of the total stock arriving at the Ontario stock yards. Gross value of stock handled was \$21,953,598 with net earnings at \$39,674.

A committee report indicates that approximately 40 persons of managerial capacity and with appropriate abilities, interest, and training will be required each year for the next five years to manage the expanding cooperative program of UCO.

UCO's debenture program has continued on a satisfactory level, with sales for the year amounting to about \$300,000, mostly on a 20-year basis and vielding 5 per cent.

Extreme difficulties are being encountered in securing steel and concrete for the new feed plant at Guelph and has resulted in a delay in construction progress.

A central marketing plan for co-op creameries has been set up with UCO concentrating on merchandising and selling, and local creameries and milk plants giving greater attention to procuring and processing. Eight co-operatives have joined in with this plan, and with the UCO plants at Guelph and Wingham, a total of ten plants are involved in this new central marketing program. These ten cooperatives produce a quarter of the butter manufactured in Ontario.
