## CHOOSE ARCHITECT TONIGHT FOR NEW MILTON HOSPITAL

The Board of Directors of the Milton District Hospital held their monthly meeting in the offices of the P. L. Robertson Manufacturing Co. Ltd. on December 28th. The possibility of engaging the services of a hospital consultant was mentioned but was adjourned for further discussion at a special meeting being held tonight at which time the appointment of an architect will also be decided. A Finance Committee also will be formed.

Achie Service, reeve of Nassagaweya, repeated a suggestion he had made at a previous meeting of the Hospital Board, that if the county would decide to put a half-mill rate on the assessment in 1956, splitting it between the hospitals in the county, considerable benefit would be derived. The county would gain, he said, if we could get sufficient hospital facilities to avoid having to send patients, especially indigent ones, outside the county. A township is normally charged back for a portion of such service and this entails spending considerable money every month — money which goes out of the county and could be diverted to support hospitals in the county.

There was unanimous agreement with Mr. Service's views and further discussion also brought a motion on another aspect of cooperation that could be effected within the county by hospitals. Bruce MacNab proposed and Mr. Service seconded that the Milton District Hospital study further the co-ordination of hospitals within the county and adjacent municipalities with a view of establishing an advisory board.

Mrs. Milton Brown mentioned that organizations were already asking how they could donate gifts of rooms and furniture to the hospital. It was agreed that all necessary information on such points would be given out at the earliest possible moment and that such gifts would be announced publicly as soon as made.

## Annie Louise Bessey Oakville Nonagenarian

A former Georgetown district resident Miss Annie Louise Bessey, 90, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John S. Bessey died in Oakville Saturday, December 31st.

Surviving are her sister Clara and her brother Herb, both of Toronto. While in Georgetown she was an active member of First Baptist Church. About 35 years ago she moved to Toronto, and later to Oakville.

The funeral service was conducted last Tuesday afternoon at the Russell & Sons Funeral Home, Oakville, by the Rev. McWhinney, minister of Oakville Baptist Church. Interment followed in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
