ROADSIDE 4-H GATE SIGN NEW PROJECT

A special project completed by the fifteen member Onslow 4-H Garden Club in Nova Scotia this year, was the placing of 4-H gate signs at the entrance to each club member's home. Assistance was provided in the purchase of the standard 4-signs, now common across Canada, by the local municipal council and it was a cooperative effort of all club members with the girls responsible for the painting of the posts and the boys assembling and erecting the poles.

Standard measurement for the post and poles were provided by the Engineering Department at Truro. These included four inches in diameter and eight feet above the ground for the main post; cross piece for suspending the 4-H sign; 3½" by 2½"; and for the supporting angle brace, 3" x 2¼". According to C. A. Douglas, Director of Extension, much of the credit for the success of the project goes to the energetic leadership and interest of Mrs. Frank Baird, the club's local leader. In addition to the road sign project and the care of their individual gardens, the members of the club also sponsored a 4-H vegetable display at this year's Truro Exhibition, a weed seed mounting and identification contest and the building and erecting of swings on the grounds of the local public school.
