Forester C. R. Groves Home, School Speaker

Monday night Roy Hansen presided over the annual Fathers' Night program at Wrigglesworth School for the Home and School Association.

The men had chosen Forestry for their subject, partly because of their interest in nature and partly because Georgetown's industry contains two large paper coating mills which are part of the forest industry.

The speaker, C. R. Groves, regional forester for Halton and Wellington counties was introduced by Robert McMenemy.

In his talk, he defined forestry as the science of managing forests for the continuous production of forest products. Though these two counties are far removed from concentrated forested areas, he said, farm woodlots are of vital importance for logs, veneers, syrup, and conservation of moisture, soil and wild life.

Mr. Groves outlined some of the progress being made towards replanting of marginal lands with trees. Some of the dangers to our forests, he said, are fire, disease, insects and clear cutting.

An appropriate film "Wood for a Million Years" was shown. This had as its focal point the care of forested areas and the selective cropping carried on in parts of New Brunswick.

To conclude the Fathers' Night program coffee and doughnuts were served.
