WHAT COUNCIL DID

Ask Planning Dept. Send Representative

Council on Monday decided to ask the Dept. of Planning to send a representative to a future meeting to explain the set-up of a planning board.

Members were confused by an answer to a request to establish a planning area in the town when a letter from the department suggested a joint application from the town and Esqueing.

Mayor Armstrong said he understood that each should have their own planning board, with a possible intermediate board to deal with questions affecting the two municipalities.

Smith and Stone, who have already been given permission for a building extension which will come within ten feet of Ontario Street have since decided to make a larger addition which will stretch farther along the street. They were given approval for this.

Cr. LeRoy Dale suggested that some time in the future water should be put under a public utilities commission. A vote of the people would be necessary before this could be done, the mayor said.

Debentures to be issued this year total \$750,000.

Major items include \$300,000 for waterworks; \$260,000 for hydro, this to be the entire responsibility of the hydro commission; \$43,000 for municipal building alterations; \$64,000 highway resurfacing; \$32,000 for

WAX PAPER HELPS FIRE LIGHTING

In many rural areas in Canada, the good old wood stove is still in use — still temperamental and difficult to light, on occasion. Pouring coal oil into the stove has caused the loss of many homes and has taken lives. To help light a stubborn fire, include in the kindling pieces of wax paper, carded ends or thin sticks of wood dipped in coal oil. These will burn quickly but will not cause an uncontrollable flash fire.
