### Glen United Congregation Reviews Year's Activity

The United Church annual meeting was held last Monday evening, January 16th. The meeting opened with a devotional period led by Rev. W. E. Gill, his theme being "Finding the will of God." ### FARM NEWS

#### HALTON ACCREDITED T.B. FREE AREA

At a recent livestock meeting in Halton the question came up: "When will Halton be due for another general test under the TB Area Plan?" Upon investigation we find that the last general test in Halton was in 1951. Inasmuch as the percentage of reactors did not exceed two-tenths of one per cent, Halton was then declared an Accredited TB Free Area for a period of six years. Consequently, the accreditation of Halton does not expire until May 1st, 1957. Cattle from such area herds are eligible to be shipped for export to the US the same as cattle from any other herd in an accredited area. As a matter of fact, it is possible to extend such accreditation for an additional three year period, if there is no indication that Tuberculosis is increasing. In the event that the three year extension period is not granted, then a general retest will likely commence in Halton in sufficient time to re-accredit the area by 1957.

### FARM FORUMS

#### Farmers Discuss Way For Solving Problems

Reports received from Halton county farm forum groups show a good attendance at all forums on January 16th. The topic under discussion was "The Farmers and government, in what ways farmers might more effectively solve their agricultural problems."

All groups agreed an individual farmer can accomplish a great deal by being well informed through reading farm bulletins, magazines, etc. He should give support, both active and financial, to farm organizations.

As members of these organizations they should attend meetings and take more interest in Federation of Agriculture work, acting as missionaries to get others interested.

Most forums decided a planned approach to local members of parliament would be more effective in dealing with local agricultural problems than pressure groups, but the latter would accomplish more at provincial and dominion level.
