**The School That Never Needs a Bell**

Getting their children off to school is no problem for parents whose sons and daughters attend the model school at Miraflores in La Paz, Bolivia, attached to the Higher Teacher Training Institute. It is run, with advice from experts from the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, on the premise that "a child's interest in learning is natural." The children have such a thirst for knowledge that no bell is needed to summon them to class in the morn-

ings. Indeed, the school, which opened in 1953, has never had a bell. The teaching methods developed here are spreading to other schools; in one of them, children have been taught to read and write within 50 to 60 days.
