The annual seed fair sponsored by the Halton Soil and Crop . Improvement Association is scheduled for Milton on March 23rd and 24th states E. Ross Segsworth, president of the Association. This event always attracts a "full house" and the association has been successful in securing Hon. F. S. Thomas, Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, as guest speaker on the afternoon of Saturday, March 24th. The Hon. Mr. Thomas is a native of the Streetsville district and consequently has many friends and farmer acquaintances in Halton. The Soil and Crop leaders of the county have revised their prize list considerably with a view to encouraging more exhibitors. As in former years, special classes are provided for those with seed for sale - all entries in these classes must be backed by government grade and further the seed offered for sale must be of the same quality and grade as that exhibited. In addition, other classes are being provided with no restrictions on cleaning, etc other than that the grain, small seeds, etc. must have been grown by the exhibitor in 1955. In short, for these additional classes it is not necessary to have seed, etc. for sale in order to be eligible to show. This section open to the county of Halton will include classes for wheat, oats, barley, small seeds, grain corn, potatoes, 1st cut hay, 2nd cutting of hay, chopped hay,

4% DIVIDEND DECLARED BY S & S CREDIT UNION

Members of the Smith and Stone Employees' Credit Union, who attended their second annual meeting, held on Tuesday, January 17th had the year's business outlined to them by the Board of Directors and the various committee chairmen. The reports given showed that another highly successful year had been completed, with increased activity in all phases of un-

ion services to members. Highlighting the decisions made by the meeting was the declaration of a 4% dividend on all shares held by members. Another outstanding accomplishment was the decision give a 10 per cent rebate on all interest paid by members on loans they had had from the Credit Union during the year. This year, also, the membership will have their annual dues to the Ontario Credit Union League, with which the local union is affiliated, paid by the Credit Union, rather than having to pay them personally as in the past. A sum of \$200 was added to the Union's guarantee fund from the year's revenue.

The treasurer's report, given by treasurer John Glynn reviewed the financial statements given to each member. The fact that over \$20,000 had been loaned to members during the 12 month period accounted for the high revenue which enabled the Union to give the various benefits this

Members now have almost \$12,000 deposited in shares, and this figure is growing by leaps and bounds, as more and more members avail themselves of the convenient saving facilities provided by their Credit Union. Mr. Glynn pointed out that the great volume of free work done by collectors and other members had kept operating expenses to a low figure of \$104.38, thus helping to keep the net profits high. He also thanked president Tom Niven, the previous year's treasurer, for the help and guidance

he had given. President Niven combined his remarks with a report on behalf of Education chairman Gerry McCrea, who was unable to attend the meeting. Mr. Niven noted that no active campaign had been carried out this year to increase membership, but nonetheless membership had grown steadily. He felt that an energetic publicity program planned for 1956, now that the Credit Union is firmly established, would result in remarkable increase of membership from the plant employees and members of their families, who are also eligible. The president outlined the free insurance coverage which members receive on their share deposits up to an amount of \$1,000 and the fact that all loans are life insured, free. This means

that should a member die with a loan balance outstanding, the debt is automatically cancelled. His heirs would also receive the balance in his share acount, plus an equal sum from the life insurance provided.

Vice president Stan Allen noted that while the problem of those who were delinquent in loan repayments is not serious, such cases were a source of annoyance to the board of directors as they have to be reviewed by the hoard at every monthly meeting. They also interfere with the smooth and efficient operation of the union. To date it has been unnecessary to invoke any of the wage assignment which members sign on receiving a loan, but when necessary the board would take this action to safeguard the deposits of other memhers. He also pointed out that members who become delinquent lost one of their most valuable assets, that is their good credit rating.

The report of the Credit Committee, which passes on all loan applications from members, was given by committee member Gord Inglis, substituting for chairman Hugh Lindsay, who was unable to attend. Third member of this committee is George Tizzard. The Supervisory Committee, who are in effect the Union's internal auditors, was composed this year of Eric Londesboro, Jack Timleck, and Robert Mc-Menemy. Chairman Londesboro presented their report showing that the books were checked carefully at frequent intervals, and that a pass book check audit had also been carried out during the year.

Elections held during the evening resulted in Gord Inglis being returned to the Credit Committee for a further 3 year term as was Jack Timleck to the Supervisory Committee. Frank Emery was elected to a three year term on the Board of Directors, and Doug Sargent, last year's secretary, was again placed on the Board.

At the close of the business portion of the meeting, refreshments were served by a committee headed by Mrs. Eric Londesboro.

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
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
