Snow

Exchange of a portion of Delrex property for an unopened road allowance which will be closed to fit in with subdivision plans, was arranged between the town and the development company Monday when council passed a road closing by-law.

Objection had been made to closing the road by Esquesing Township, which claimed that it would cut off access to land in the township owned by Provincial Paper.

Last week, council decided to leave a portion of the road allowance to allow this access, but when the subject was dealt with Monday it was found that the roadway would be an expensive one to open if ever needed, as it goes over a steep cliff.

Rex Heslop, Alan Campbell and Harold Bairstow of the Delrex company, who were at the meeting, said that the portion of land in question is not of paramount importance to the company, though it would mean creating two smaller industrial sites instead of one large one. They suggested it would be mutually beneficial to have the road allowance in a better location.

Mr. Heslop said that his plans would be held up if any by-law amendments were made because of the legal routine needed, and that if the by-law passed that evening, he would give a written undertaking to give a road allowance at either one of 'wo

locations discussed. This met with council favour, and the by-law was passed.

Requests by three taxi operators for a parking stand in front of their downtown locations was turned over to the police committee for recommendation. W. O. Brownridge spoke for himself, Jack's Taxi and Glen Taxi is requesting this.

Four residents of the new Swanek subdivision asked questions about assessment and tax rate and were referred to assessment commissioner Joseph Gibbons for answers.

Donald Thompson, Guelph St. resident, asked what action is being taken to have a sidewalk in front of the Georgeview shopping area, saying it is dangerous for pedestrians. He was told by road chairman Walter Gray that a decision will soon 'be made by this committee.

Halton Health Unit reported that one county municipality has questioned whether a 20 per cent share of fees collected for plumbing inspections is enough. Georgetown decided to have the matter discussed at the Tri-Urban board meeting.

The Georgetown Lumber Co., Ltd., established 35 years ago by Howard Kentner, has been sold.

The business transfer will be completed this week and new owners are the Beaver Lumber Co., Ltd., a large firm with some 50 branches throughout Canada. The firm's head office is in Winnipeg and its Ontario divis-

ion headquarters is in St. Catharines. Whitney (Whit) Campbell, who will be manager in Georgetown arrived in town Monday. A native of Campbellton, NB, he comes to town from Hagersville where he has been manager of another branch for two years. Prior to that he was with the firm in Niagara Falls.

Mr. Campbell's wife and their sons, Lane, 6 and Clayton, 3 will be joining him in town as soon as they find a house. The family are members of the Roman Catholic Church.

Mr. Campbell is particularly interested in scouting. He has maintained his interest in the organization since he joined it as a youngster and in Niagara Falls he served as district scoutmaster.

When Georgetown Lumber was organized in 1920, it took over the former H. P. Lawson sawmill and is still in the same location on Water Street. A steady program of expansion and building has left little of the original buildings, except for the small stone building nearest the road, last used as a blacksmith shop. A fire in 1944 destroyed the planing mill and this has been peplaced, while the sales office and warehouse which front the street have been enlarged and modernized at various times through the

The firm was in the contracting business until eight years ago, and since then has concentrated on retail lumber, building supplies and mill work. The staff of ten will all be retained by the new management.

The company at one time had branches in Milton and Acton, but disposed of these a few years ago in order to concentrate on a steadily-growing local business.

In 1934 Mr. Kentner was joined in the firm by his son Claude, who was at that time working for the Bank of Montreal in Windsor. He managed the Milton branch, then came to Georgetown when it was sold.

In 1935, they purchased the coal business of the John McDonald Estate and have since operated it as W. H. Kentner & Son, adding fuel oil as a product two years ago. They will continue to operate this business

Howard Kentner is one of George-

town's best known citizens, both as a businessman and in private life. He has been an active community worker, and at various times has served as a school trustee, hydro commissioner, member of the old arena board and later on the Board of Parks, and as an elder in St. John's United Church. Born near Ballinafad, he worked in Toronto with the Eureka Refrigerator Co. as a young man then was in partnership with the late Albert Tost as a house contractor before establishing his lumber company.

## SUGGEST MORE INSURANCE ON TOWN-OWNED BUILDINGS

A comprehensive report in insurance on municipal buildings, presented to council on Monday by a firm acting for Barber Agency and Walter T. Evans and Co. suggested substantial boosts in some policies, and advised coverage on some properties which now carry no insurance. The report pointed out that only

\$8,000 insurance is carried on the municipal hall which is valued at

The report was left with the finance

committee of council, who will study it further.

Referring to a Herald editorial suggesting a council appointee on the Citizens' Band committee, Mayor Armstrong said it was a worthwhile suggestion, and the band committee had also indicated their approval. Cr. Harry Hale was named by council to represent them.

A letter was received from United Suburban Gas, indicating their willingness to purchase as much gas from Anthony Gas for use in North Halton is is needed, should United get franchises for distribution.

Al Norton asked \$1500 for land owned by him on John St. across which a large sewer is being installed to service the Swanek subdivision. Mr. Norton said the sewer is depreciating the land for commercial purposes, and that it would be of future value to the town as a park site.

Councillors expressed surprise, as they assumed an easement had been secured for the sewer, and the matter was turned over to the town solicitor.

Council and town officials were invited by Rex Heslop to make a bus tour of Delrex subdivision, and the trip is planned for the afternoon of March 3rd.

Reeve Stan Allen mentioned extensive water breaks, particularly in the Sunbeam Heights district, and blamed them on faulty installation and use of transite pipe.

Cr. Alfred Sykes said that he believes the town should hire contractors to make major installations like water lines and not leave such specialized installations to the town works staff.
