ST. GEORGE'S SPEAKERS**

Members of the Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen conducted the Sunday services in St. George's Church while the rector, Rev. Kenneth Richardson was absent, attending a pre-Lenten retreat in the States.

Speakers at the services were Edwin Wilson and Sam Penrice, people's warden.

Mr. Wilson, who also conducted the morning service in St. Alban's, Glen Williams, spoke about the popularity of quiz contests nowadays, and said David was the original prizewinner when he gave several reasons in one of the Psalms why he liked God. He challenged church people to be as familiar with God as they are with worldly things, and to be able to answer, as David did "I like God because..."

At the evening service, Mr. Penrice gave some pertinent thoughts on what a Christian should believe, and outlined an increased budget campaign which St. George's must undertake this year to meet current expenses and to provide funds for improvements including a new organ. God's house, he said, must not reflect unfavourably with our own homes, and should command the best in furnishings.
