**Catherine Hortop Active Baptist Church Worker**

For most of her life a resident of Glen Williams, and a faithful member of First Baptist Church which she served as clerk from 1925 to 1935, Catherine Elizabeth Hortop, 77, was buried in Greenwood Cemetery here last Wednesday.

She had been an invalid since she suffered a severe stroke seven years ago.

Miss Hortop lived with her sister, the late Mrs. Robert McMaster in the Glen and was an employee of Beaumont Knitting Mills for some time. She attended the Glen public school and later Georgetown High School. She moved to Toronto several years ago, then to Hamilton where she made her home with a niece. Predeceased by her sister and a brother, James, her closest survivor is one brother, William Hortop of Toronto.

The funeral service was held Wednesday at the Swackhamer and Hiltz funeral home in Hamilton.

**AT ESQUESING COUNCIL**

**Seek Engineer's Opinion On Glen Soil Erosion**

Esquising Council, at their meeting on February 6th, requested Credit Valley Conservation Authority to supply an engineering opinion on the erosion problem at Glen Williams Cemetery. Council recommended, that Douglas R. Wilson, Georgetown town engineer, make the survey.

A by-law was passed providing for a fee charge for inspection of plumbing, septic tank and drainage installations.

The township will advertise for tenders to supply, crush and deliver approximately 15,000 yards of gravel on town-ship roads in 1956.

Road superintendent William Townsend was appointed a delegate to the Ontario Good Roads convention.

A total of \$80 was paid in fox claims. Receiving this were Frank Jones, Acton, \$12; Ed Robertson, \$9; Emerson Anderson, Ed Martin, Alf Bridgen, \$6 each; and \$3 each to Don Hancock, William Thompson, Alf Bridgen, Peter Joosten, Sandy Barnes, William Tuck, Charles Norton.

At an earlier meeting on January 23rd, \$69 was paid in similar claims, these being to Alf Bridgen and Douglas Leslie, \$12 each; Edward Robertson, \$10; John Bush and Jack Tizzard, \$9 each; Clare Wilson, George Burt and Robert Sutherland, \$3 each.

On January 23rd, a by-law was passed requiring the licensing of all dogs owned or harboured in the township.

A Court of Revision preceded the meeting February 6th. Portions of taxes were refunded to four property owners, three of whom had lost buildings in fires and another who had been wrongly assessed. Taxes on two properties exempt from taxation were also struck off the roll.
