Lorne Scots Regiment Plans for Recruiting

Many of the local Lorne Scots militia turned out Thursday to start a new training syllabus.

Sgt. J. Doherty called the parade, carrying out the usual roll call and inspection, then turned the parade over to Sgt. Bruce Harley who continued with the first lecture. It was a breakdown of the infantry battalion.

Sgt. Doherty gave the first of a series of ten lectures on the light machine gun. The final period was cancelled Thursday, but is usually reserved for CSM Murray on the parade square. Due to the fact that "C" Company's sergeant-major was preoccupied, we have Mr. Murray's promise that he will work the company twice as hard next week.

Tomorrow is pay parade for all ranks in Brampton. "C" Company will parade at 2000 hours in the Georgetown Army, then proceed to Brampton by P.O.M.C.

In the last year or two, the Lorne Scots, and especially "C" Company, which has its headquarters in Georgetown have been very strict on discipline. Due to this, many men have been struck off strength, leaving the local militia with a small nucleus. In the near future, "C" Company is intending to have an extensive recruiting drive. Bruce Harley, Jim Bradford and Pat Chamberlain say that within two months they hope to have many of the old veterans back in the unit to renew the fellowship that was well-known by anyone who served with the Scots. Bill Emmerson, John Doherty, and Barry Timleck are recruiting for an expeditionary force, consisting only of Lorne Scots, for the Far East. Out of the 500 man objective, from the last report they have only 447 men still to find.

Seriously, there will be no recruiting this Thursday, but "C" Company will parade again on Thursday the 23rd, at which time the offer will be open for anyone wishing to join the unit.

Dairy Farmers Plan April Milk Promotion

In April, the accent is on fluid milk right across the country. Dairy Farmers of Canada, the national dairy group are well underway with plans for their annual Milk Festival promotion, which will spotlight milk, "Nature's fine refreshment," for a full month period.

The campaign, the third this year sponsored by the producer organization, is kicking off with large space advertising in high circulation daily newspapers with the theme, "after winter's let down, brighten up . . . drink 3 glasses of milk a day!" Using daily and weekly newspapers as their primary medium, this first salvo will be supported later in the month by 500 line advertisements running in the larger dailies along with a 250 line message in 58 other dailies and 270 weeklies. French radio, color advertising in four national women's magazines and a black and white message in the Weekend Picture Magazine will also lend selling help to the drive.

In the field of merchandising, the dairy industry has been encouraged by direct mail to organize local sales programs in conjunction with the national campaign to help put the milk sales over the top this year. Full page advertising in 10 business papers next month will also alert the trade. To assist sellers of milk to advertise, merchandise and publicize, a full line-up of selling aids has been produced by Dairy Farmers of Canada.

The Dairy Foods Service Bureau, a division of Dairy Farmers of Canada are backing up the entire program with publicity releases to dailies, and weeklies, farm press, week-end papers, magazines, radio and TV.
