Dairy Farmers Plan April Milk Promotion

In April, the accent is on fluid milk right across the country. Dairy Farmers of Canada, the national dairy group are well underway with plans for their annual Milk Festival promotion, which will spotlight milk, "Nature's fine refreshment," for a full month period.

The campaign, the third this year sponsored by the producer organization, is kicking off with large space advertising in high circulation daily newspapers with the theme, "after winter's let down, brighten up drink 3 glasses of milk a day!" Using daily and weekly newspapers as their primary medium, this first salvo will he supported later in the month by 500 line advertisements running in the larger dailies along with a 250 line message in 58 other dailies and 270 weeklies. French radio, color advertising in four national women's magazines and a black and white message in the Weekend Picture Magazine will also lend selling help to the drive.

In the field of merchandising, the dairy industry has been encouraged by direct mail to organize local sales programs in conjunction with the national campaign to help put the milk sales over the top this year. Full page advertising in 10 business papers next month will also alert the trade. To assist sellers of milk to advertise, merchandise and publicize, a full line-up of selling aids has been produced by Dairy Farmers of Can-

The Dairy Foods Service Bureau, a division of Dairy Farmers of Canada are backing up the entire program with publicity releases to dailies, and weeklies, farm press, week-end papers, magazines, radio and TV.
