WHAT COUNCIL DID

Why More Industrial Land? Delrex Has Plenty: Dale

A discussion on setting up a Georgetown Planning Board, led to a plea by Cr. LeRoy Dale that the Moore and Cleave properties be considered future residential areas, when council dealt with this matter at a meeting Thursday.

Council had invited John Pearson, field liaison officer for the Dept. of Planning and Development to inform them about the necessary procedure in setting up a local planning board, Dr. H. G. Faludi, who is coming to a future meeting to present a zoning plan which he is suggesting for the town, was also invited to sit in at the meeting.

Mr. Dale received an affirmative reply from Dr. Faludi to his question that it would be several years before land in the Delrex subdivision earmarked for industry will be used up, and used this as an argument that it would not seem sensible to have still further land set aside for the same purpose.

He said that Delrex annexation has

made the town lopsided with relations to the downtown business district, and that housing in the 150 acres on the Moore and Cleave properties would round out the picture. (A subdivision by-law passed last year by council, would require owners of large parcels of land agreeing to provide a 40-60 ratio between industries and housing before subdividing would be allowed.)

The matter will come up for further discussion when Dr. Faludi presents his, as yet, secret information. It is not known at present what any of the planning firm's recommendations will be.

Mr. Pearson explained the mechanics of legislation for establishment of planning boards.

A planning area must be defined, he said, and it can be either a town or a combination of town and surrounding township. It is composed of four, six or eight members plus the mayor as ex officio member. Councillors can sit on the board but must be in the minority.

He considers that a strictly local board would be best for Georgetown at the present time, with informal discussions on mutual questions with township officials when the need arises.

He suggested members named to the planning board should have a knowledge of Georgetown's history, should represent the various kinds of people who live in the town, and should be level-headed men and women who will take various problems in the proper sequence.

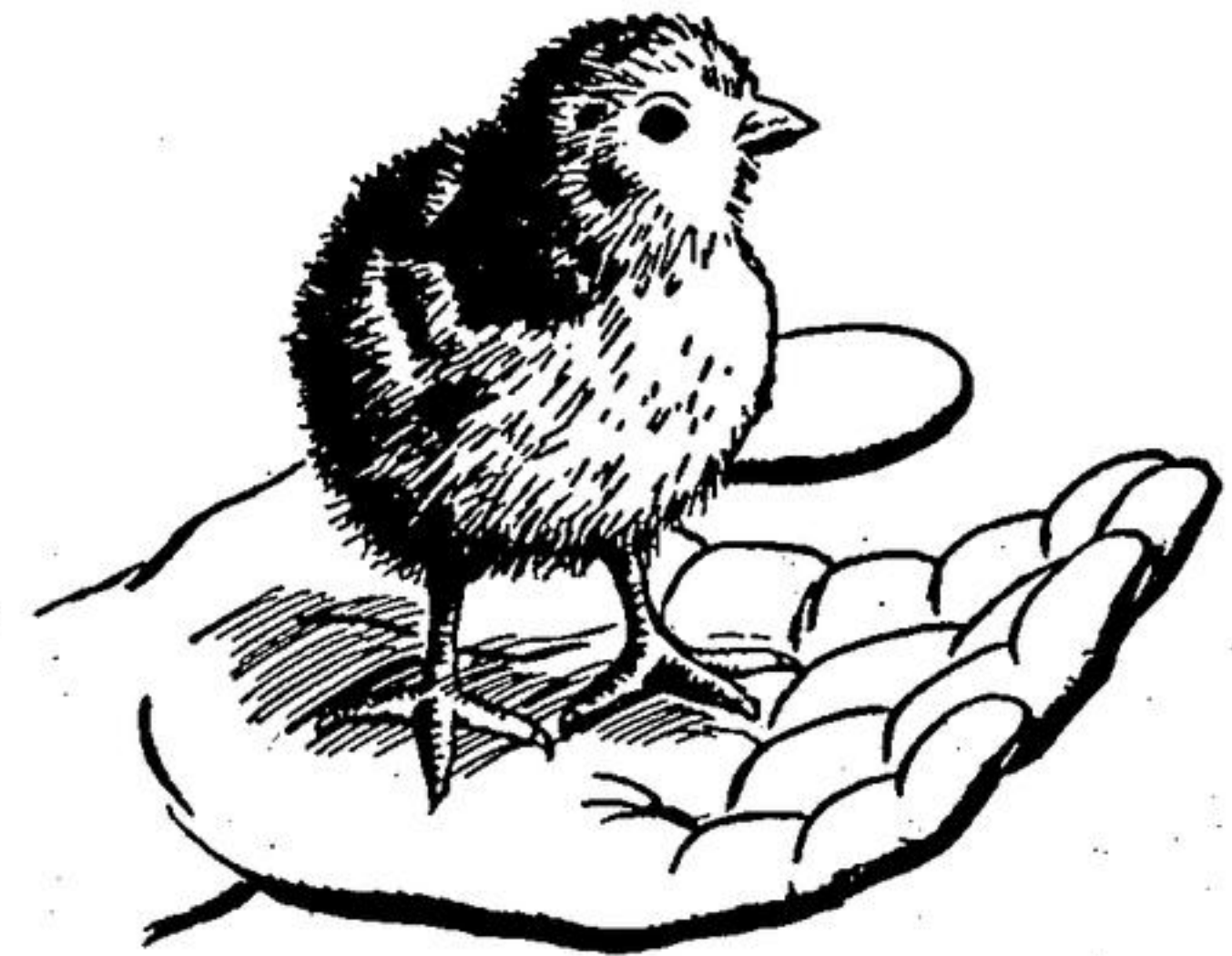
The board, he said, is responsible to the council and the community, and its decisions are not binding in themselves, but are rather in an advisory capacity to council which must do the actual legislating.

The board must be thoroughly familiar with the building by-law and all legislation affecting property.

Dr. Faludi advised council about the importance of having a planning board, and of keeping it local. There are, sometimes conflicting opinions between urban and rural men on the same board, he said, and it is difficult for a joint board, to arrive at opinions.

Georgetown has "breathing space" for the next fifteen years, he said, with the large unbuild areas taken into the town last year, he said. While the question of undesirable fringe developments in the township has been cited as a reason for a joint planning board, he said there is little chance of this happening on a large scale because Esquesing has neither sewage or water lines.
