FARM FORUMS

Forums Discuss Father And Son Partnerships

On February 6th, National Farm Radio Forum studied the important topic of "Father and Son Partnership". Forums were asked what they considered the most important points to be taken into consideration when drawing up such a partnership and what arrangements should be made to provide for transfer of the farm business

to the son. All Halton groups reporting said a written agreement between the parties concerned was very important.

Still Hope Debentures

Will Sell at 44 Per Cent Possibility of raising the interest rate on Georgetown debentures to 5 per cent in order to secure a premium was turned down by council when they further discussed sale of a \$60,000 4% % issue with Mr. McCutcheon of aBnkers Bond Corporation,

at a meeting Thursday. Council, at their January meeting engaged the bond firm to privately market the issue, wkhich will provide funds for a number of municipal improvements including a large waterwodks extension, a \$260,000 hydro program, public school addition, municipal building addition an da number of sewers, sidewalks and watermains. Bankers' Bonds has until February 29 to sell the 4% % one to 20 year debentures at a price not less than \$100.50.

Mr. McCutcheon explained that since thed iscussion in January, he had found the option price out of line with the present municipal bond market. He suggested two alternatives. If the interest rate remains at 434% he made a ne wolfer of a firm bid or a slightly higher option price, both below par. If the interest rate were raised to 5 per cent he made two further offers, both of which were above

Mayor Armstrong and Reeve Allen both spoke against selling bonds at a discount, while the mayor also intimated that he would not favour a "private deal" for 50 per cent bonds, but would prefer to call for tenders should council raise the interest

Mayor Armstrong pointed out that the town has a present assessment of \$6,800,000 and at least an extra million dollars in supplementary assessments since this figure was compiled. As assessment is based roughly on one third actual value, the mayor said, Georgetown is worth at least 25 million dollars and there is not the slightest doubt that town bonds have a sound backing and are saleable.

Mr. McCutcheon was told that his firm will have until the end of the month to sell bonds under the January 30th agreement, and that at the present time council is not prepared to float a " p.r c.nt issue or to accept less than par for 4910 bonds.

Terms shot 'd be simple but quite definite. All but one group felt it advisable to have them drawn up by a lawyer. Both parties should be completely satisfied with the arrangements and accurate accounts kept.

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
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
