

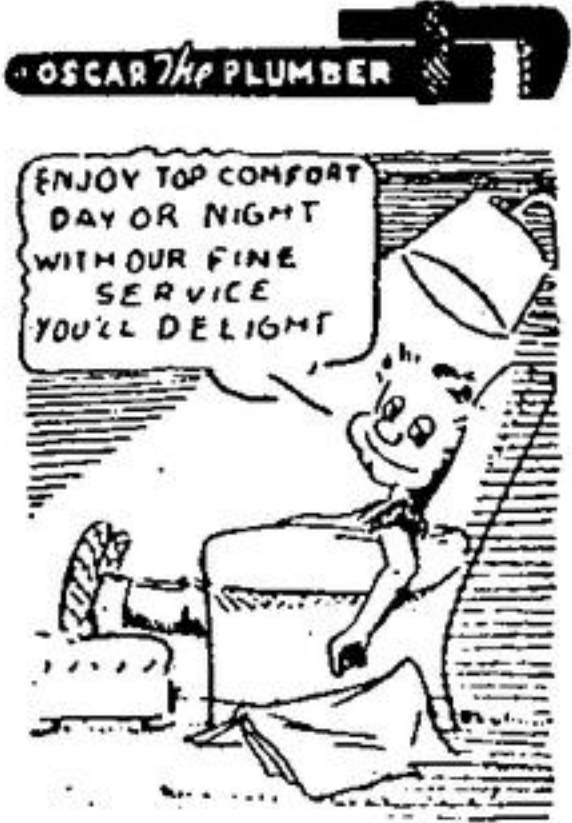
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WHAT TO DO WHERE TO GO THIS SUNDAY

Perhaps you'd like a touch of summer in February? If so, visit **ALLAN GARDENS** this Sunday, at Sherbourne and Carlton Streets, in Toronto. This is the largest botanical garden in the province and contains Ontario's largest collection of tropical plants, palms and ferns. There are countless unusual varieties of subtropical plants to be seen and the superintendent will be glad to tell you all about them. A trip to these gardens make a most interesting afternoon. Allan Gardens are open between 10.00 a.m. and 5.00 p.m. on Sundays, and are free to the public.

Or you can visit **HART HOUSE** on the University of Toronto campus between 2.00 and 4.00 p.m. The house will be open to the public this Sunday and you'll have a chance to tour thro' this famous building, to see their nationally renowned collection of Canadian paintings, and to look at the fine photographs taken by students for the current Camera Club Show.

Hart House is a gift to the University of Toronto from the Massey Foundation, and was built under the guidance of Vincent Massey. Named after Hart Massey, it was opened in 1919, as a student recreation centre for all male students of the University.

The Camera Club Show, now on display in the Hart House Art Gallery is composed of photographs taken by male students of the University. Possibly the most interesting part of the show will be the entries in the Karsh Trophy competition. Karsh, after acting as one of the judges of the show three years ago, felt that students should be recording more student activities, fewer landscapes and portraits. So he donated the Karsh Trophy, which has led to this exciting annual competition.

The Hart House Art collection, which you also may see this Sunday, is considered one of the finest collection of Canadian paintings in the country, second only to the National Gallery in Ottawa. It contains a number of paintings by the famed Group of Seven artists, plus many others.

Suggests Marriage Bonus And Qualification Tests

Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon, of Georgetown was quoted extensively in the daily papers last week, following a speech which he made to the Oakville-Trafalgar-Bronte Family Service Bureau's annual meeting.

Mr. Langdon suggested three curbs to juvenile and family delinquency: Marriage bonuses, government-subsidized marriages, and mandatory "marriage qualification" tests before licenses are issued.

Magistrate Langdon, who has served on the bench in Halton County for 12 years, said "A great many couples who apply for marriage licenses don't have any idea of the seriousness of the step.

"They are physically attracted and have no appreciation of the responsibilities which come with marriage and parenthood," he continued. "All couples should appear before a registrar or some body and prove that they are ready to wed.

"If they can't show that they fully appreciate their responsibilities a marriage license should be denied. They should not be permitted to marry until they can satisfy the registrar that they are fit.

Marriage bonuses should be granted in cases where both husband and wife must now work "to maintain a standard of living comparable to that enjoyed by those around them."

"These wives must now work and are deprived of the right to raise a fa-

mily. Government aid here would only be the next logical step after the pattern already set by baby bonuses and old age pensions," Magistrate Langdon said.

"When they're expecting, these wives should take a 'means test', if they pass it the government should give them perhaps \$100 a month until all children are 16 years old if the mother will stay at home and look after the family."

Government-subsidized marriage should come when "two people have reached the age where they are seriously considering marriage but are held away from it by reasons of finance."

"Would there be any serious objection to the government granting bank loans of from \$3,000 to \$5,000 at about one-and-a-half per cent interest to be repaid as soon as a man's earning-power has been fully established?"

He also suggested the government assist lawyers, doctors and other professional men to set up practice with loans of \$5,000 to \$7,000.

The W.A. meeting is to be held at Mrs. Blizard's home, Thursday afternoon of this week.

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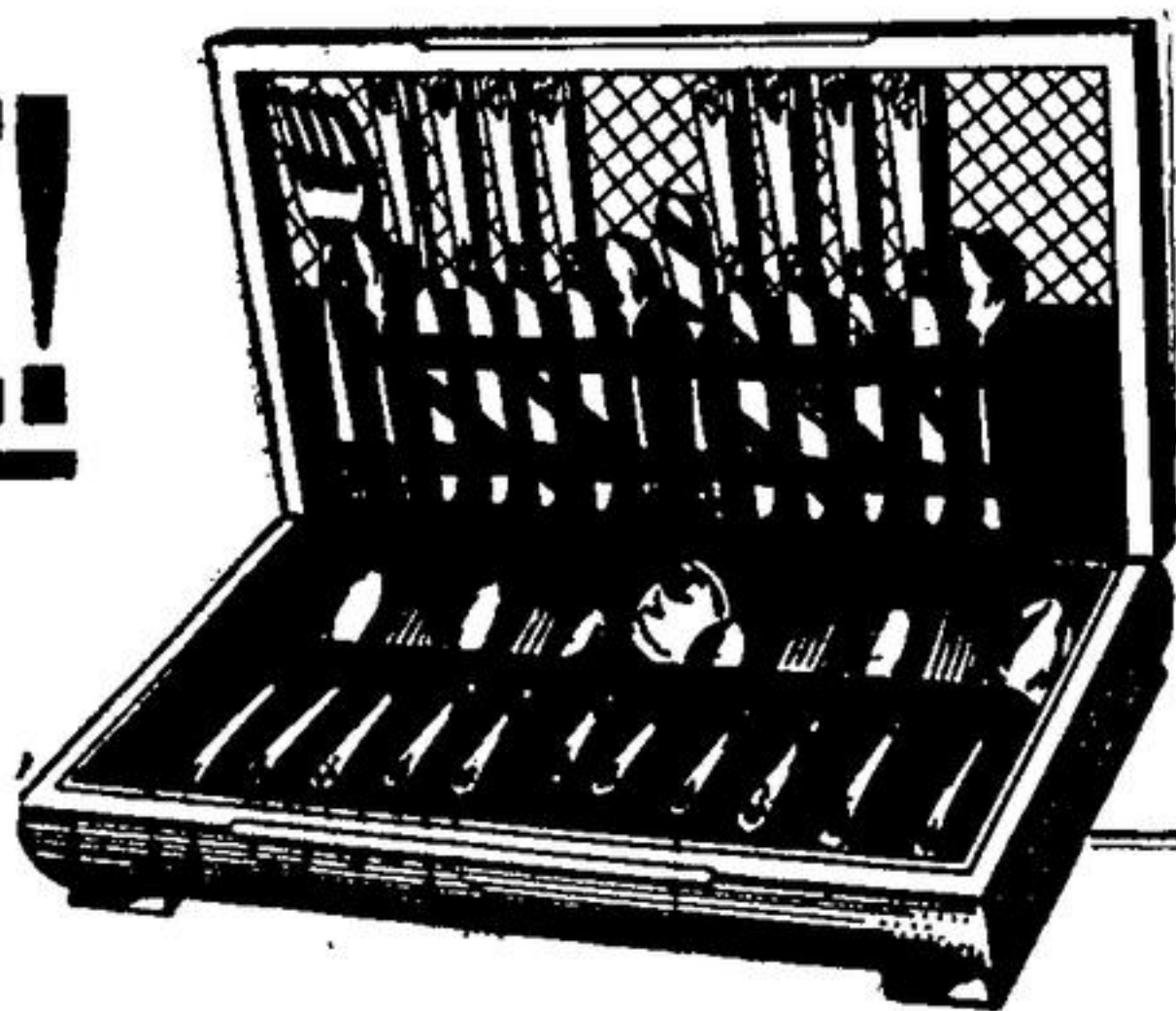
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
