**Teacher, Church Worker
Dies on Florida Vacation**

A Florida vacation for three cousins had a sad ending on February 19, when Mamie M. Campbell, 27 Park Ave., died in hospital in St. Petersburg a few hours after suffering a severe stroke.

Miss Campbell had gone south a few weeks before, accompanied by her cousins, Mrs. James Lyons, Brampton and Miss Clara Quance, Hagersville. They were having a happy time, and on the evening of February 19th were visiting with other Florida vacationers, Mr. and Mrs. Hartley Harrison of Toronto. Mr. Harrison, formerly of Acton, was a childhood neighbour of Miss Campbell.

Miss Campbell had ended her teaching career last summer when she retired from the staff of Keele St. School, Toronto where she had been a teacher for almost forty years. Prior to 1917 when she started teaching in the city, she had taught at S. S. 1, Erin, the school where she received her early education, at Britannia and at Boston Mills.

A daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Donald Campbell, she was born on their farm, lot 1, concession 11, Erin, and attended Georgetown High School before graduating from teachers' college. The family moved to Georgetown when Mr. Campbell retired from farming, and Miss Campbell continued to make her home here, maintaining an apartment in the city and spending week-ends and vacations in Georgetown.

Always an active church worker, she was a Sunday School teacher at Knox Presbyterian, and after church union performed a similar task at St. John's United, where she was also active in the W.A. and the Women's Missionary Society. Last fall, anticipating more free time to devote to church affairs, she volunteered to be envelope secretary for the Sunday School and superintendent of the Baby Band for the W.M.S. and also became treasurer of the W.A. She was also a member of the Ladies' Lawn Bowling Club.

Predeceased several years ago by a sister Sadie, Mrs. D. J. Sinclair, she leaves one sister Lizzie, Mrs. Wm. T. Sinclair and one brother, John R. Campbell, both of Georgetown. Mr. Campbell had been visiting in Tucson, Arizona with his daughter Margaret, and returned home by plane when news of her death arrived.

The funeral service in St. John's United Church on Thursday was conducted by Rev. Morgan McFarlane, with Rev. Alex Calder of Knox Church assisting. Miss Ruth Evans sang a solo and pallbearers were Wilfrid and Starret Leslie, Frank Petch, Roy Magloughlin, John Campbell, Union and her nephew, Campbell Sinclair. Flower bearers were Thomas H., Edgar and William Lyons, Albert Dolson, Wes Rutledge and Blake and George H. Leslie. Interment was in Melville Cemetery.

LOTS OF BULL

The 1956 sale of beef bulls is scheduled for the Royal Winter Fair buildings in Toronto on March 7 and 8th. Among the 283 head entered, we note two bulls entered from the well-known Angus herd of W. F. James, Georgetown; four head from S. G. Bennett's Scotsdale Shorthorn herd at Georgetown; two from the herd of Grant Campbell at Moffat and four from the Aberfeldy herd of Gardhouse, Milton. As in former years, every Ontario farmer who purchases a bull in the sale will be eligible for a grant equal to 25 per cent of the purchase price but not exceeding \$150. Furthermore, all bulls must pass a culling committee and with rigid health regulations governing the event, it should be an excellent spot for any Halton farmer requiring a beef bull to make his selection. Incidentally Hereford and Angus sell on the first day and Short-horns on the second day of this big event sponsored by the Ontario Beef Cattle Improvement Association.
