### New Highway for Southern Europe



Plans for a 3750-mile road network (outlined in black on map) which would open up new areas in Southern Europe to both tourist and trader were blueprinted by road experts from the region who met recently in Geneva under the auspices of UN's Economic Commission for Europe. The project includes a ferry-boat service between Brindist and Patras, With financial aid from abroad most of the modern circular highway could be completed by 1961. Otherwise, only Italy will meet this target date, while in Greece the objective would be 1963, and in Turkey and Yugoslavia, 1971.

#### WHAT TO DO WHERE TO GO THIS SUNDAY

This Sunday, you'll be able to see 3 unusual films about Asia, in the MUSEUM THEATRE, ROYAL ONTA-RIO MUSEUM, which is located at Bloor St. and University Avenue. The first film, "Song of Ceylon," is a lovely impressionistic picture showing something of the impact of Western civilization on the Senghalese. It features a good deal of symbolic dancing, interesting because it is so unlike the dancing we know in Canada. The second film deals with "Indonesian Dances," and the third, titled "Himalayan Paradise," depicts the beauty of Kashmir, one of the most romantic and scenic spots in all of India. We feel sure that both adults and children will find this film a most entertaining adventure. The show begins at 2.30 p.m., lasts till about 4.30. No admission is charged.

If it's a warm, sunny Sunday afternoon, how about taking a walk around one of Toronto's most scenic spots the UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO CAM-PUS? The University grounds stretch from Bloor St. to College, along wide, quiet Queen's Park. Within the grounds, you will find many wandering paths, broad lawns, and rambling buildings. University College for instance, is predominantly Romanesque in design, and its main doorway is a famous architectural feature. This college was opened in 1859 and at that time it housed the entire University. Today, with over 11,000 students at the University "U.C." is but one of the large number of buildings, ranging in design from gingerbread Victorian to the extremely modern. One of the most interesting buildings on the campus is Soldiers' Tower, built in 1924. Within its arches are inscribed the names of all University graduates who died in the two World Wars, and in the tower itself is a 42bell Carillon, with which musical recitals are given during the summer

About 4.30 or 5.00 o'clock you can treat the family to a superbly cooked meal, served in an atmosphere of relaxation and charm.
