**WHAT TO DO WHERE TO GO THIS SUNDAY**

Within its arches are inscribed the names of all University graduates who died in the two World Wars, and in the tower itself is a 42-bell Carillon, with which musical recitals are given during the summer months.

**New Highway for Southern Europe**



Plans for a 2750-mile road network (outlined in black on map) which would open up new areas in Southern Europe to both tourist and trader were blueprinted by road experts from the region who met recently in Geneva under the auspices of UN's Economic Commission for Europe. The project includes a ferry-boat service between Brindisi and Patras. With financial aid from abroad most of the modern circular highway could be completed by 1961. Otherwise, only Italy will meet this target date, while in Greece the objective would be 1963, and in Turkey and Yugoslavia, 1971.
