OUTLINES PROPOSALS HOSPITAL EXPANSION

Gordon Friesen, who addressed last night's annual meeting of Peel Memorial Hospital Association, is a native of Laird, Saskatchewan, and has been closely connected with the field of hospital administration for the past twenty-six years. He is a Fellow of the American College of Hospital Administrators. In Canada he has been associated with the Kitchener-Waterloo Hospital, the Belleville General Hospital, and the Saskatoon City Hospital. Mr. Friesen served with the RCAF from 1941 to 1946 as personal assistant to the director of medical services. With 2 years of this time spent as military governor, Kreis Brilon, West Germany. From 1952 to 1954 Mr. Friesen was affiliated with the Memorial Hospital Association of Kentucky, Washington, D.C. Mr. Friesen has been active in hospital consultant work since 1948 and established his own firm in 1954.

The other speaker at the meeting was Dr. H. Hoyle Campbell, a practicing surgeon on the staff of St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, and surgical consultant at Sunnybrook Hospital and Department of Veterans Affairs. Dr. Campbell, who is a graduate of the University of Toronto, has taken post graduate work in Canada, United States and Great Britain. He sat on the National Advisory Committee to the Federal government for the Rehabilitation of Disabled Persons for five years. Since much of Dr. Campbell's professional career has been spent in utilizing the services provided by hospitals in various countries, his interest in their efficient operation has been stimulated.

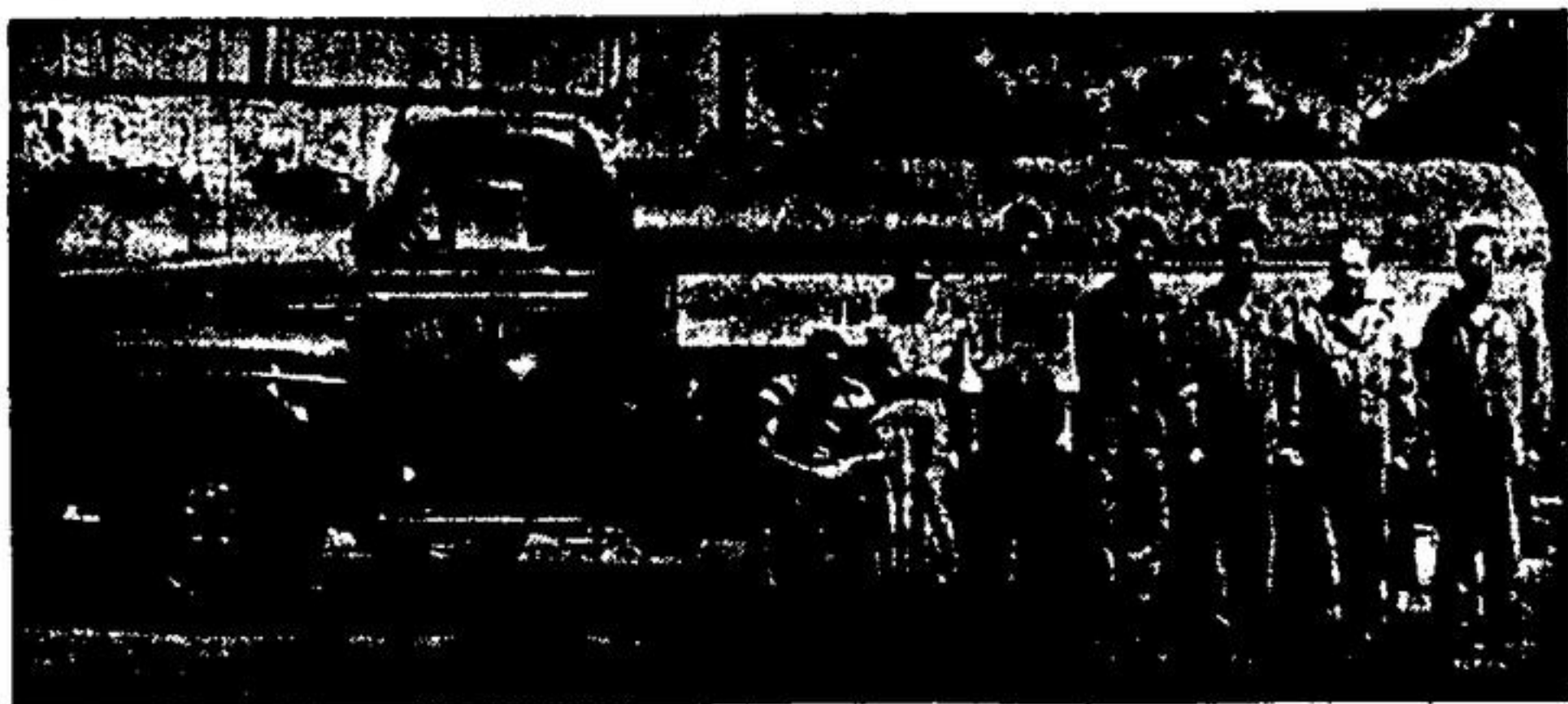
