## Double Bereavement For McDowell Family

The McDowell family suffered a double bereavement when John McDowell, 82 died at his farm home in Erin Township on February 10th and his sister, Mrs. David Ross, 80 died in Toronto on February 14th.

They were children of James and Fannie Russell McDowell and were born when their father farmed on the Stewarttown sideroad, on the present Win Bowman farm. The family later had the Lindsay farm at Limehouse, and then moved to the 4th Line. A brother of the deceased, Harvey McDowell operates the family farm there now.

John McDowell had farmed in Erin, across from Peacock School for forty years, and before that on the Town Line. He had served as a school trustee at No. 10 School.

He had been ill for a short time with heart trouble, contracted after returning home from hospital in Toronto where he had undergone an operation.

He is survived by his wife, Letitia Elliott, one son Elliott McDowell, 6 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Ross, the former Minnie McDowell, lived on a farm on the 4th Line following her marriage. Mr. and Mrs. Ross then moved to Acton, where she made her home at 112 Tyn-dall Ave.

She leaves a family of three sons, William, James and Russell, and two grandchildren.

Of an original family of eleven, eight brothers and sisters survive. Mrs. Duncan Currie, London; Mrs. Angus Lawson, Mrs. Charlotte Osborne and Harvey McDowell, R. R. 4, Acton; Mrs. Alfred Marshall, Toronto; Mrs. R. E. Choate, Brampton; James McDowell, Killarney, Manitoba; and William G. McDowell, 82 Maple Ave. W., Georgetown. A brother Bert died in 1941.

Mr. McDowell was buried in Erin Cemetery following the funeral service in Erin on February 13th.

The funeral service for Mrs. Ross was held in Port Credit on the Thursday evening following her death, and interment was made the next afternoon in Fairview Cemetery, Acton.
