## Shares, Playing Memberships Available North Halton Club

Altho' we appear to be in the middle of winter with winter sports at their height, it will be a matter of only a few weeks until we begin our summer activities. It would seem, therefore, to be the opportune time to bring to the attention of the North Halton residents, particularly the newcomers to the area, the facilities offered by the North Halton Golf and Country Club.

The reopening of the club was made possible two years ago mainly through the efforts of Mr. K. M. Langdon and a group of district citizens. During these past two years since the club was organized, there has been a great deal of active interest on the part of its members as well as the many pleasant hours spent making full use of the club's facilities.

During this past winter, the clubhouse has been open and members who are sport enthusiasts have taken advantage of the grounds for skiing and tobogganing. Improvements to the clubhouse have been carried out during the winter months and it is expected that, with the coming of the golfing season, luncheon facilities will be available to members.

There are a limited number of shares available in this private golf club but as the population of the district increases, the demand for membership in the club will increase. When all these shares in the club have been purchased, it is expected that membership will be confined to shareholders only. However, it has been decided by the board of directors that for the coming year applications for playing members for the year will be considered. Memberships will be at the same rate as for shareholders.

Again, for the benefit of those who are interested, this excellent nine-hole course is not open to pay-as-you play golfers and therefore is not congested. Furthermore the club has a very active ladies section with Tuesday as their match day. The men's section is well organized and has Thursday as their day. As well, there are field days and tournaments held periodically throughout the season. The Club professional is interested in giving group lessons to Junior members to encourage their interest and improve their game.

Social activities such as dances and bridge parties are held throughout the year.

### AT ESQUESING COUNCIL

#### TOWNSHIP CONSIDERS PURCHASE OF TRUCK

Esquensing council, at their February 20th meeting, requested permission from the Dept. of Highways to advertise for tenders to purchase a new one-ton truck.

Thirteen was an unlucky number for the township fox population, which was depleted by that amount, according to \$3.00 claims submitted for bounty. A by-law was passed empowering the reeve and clerk to sign a compensation agreement by which the town of Acton will pay the township for lands annexed by Acton.

At a special meeting on February 16th, the township council approved a building programme proposed by the North Halton high school district by which a \$175,000 addition will be made to Georgetown high school. Esquensing agreed to be liable for their share of expense as the equalized assessment of the municipality bears to the equalized assessment of North Halton district.

#### Bert Dangelo, 61 Was Brampton Town Employee

An employee of the Brampton Works Department for many years, Bert Dangelo, 61, died suddenly at his home on Wellington Street East, Sunday night, February 26th.

Mr. Dangelo was a native of Peschici, Italy, and came to Canada in 1911. He lived in Welland, Hamilton and Toronto before moving to Brampton in 1937. For a number of years he was supervisor of the town's garbage disposal. He was a Canadian Army veteran and a member of the Canadian Legion.

Mr. Dangelo leaves his wife, the former Janet Goodlet; their three children, Sadie (Mrs. Martin McCristall) of Brampton; Jean (Mrs. Fred Gummerson) of Georgetown; and Albert of Oshawa. He also leaves two sons by a previous marriage, the first Mrs. Dangelo having predeceased her husband. They are Matthew of Malton and Joseph of Toronto.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. C. A. Johnson at the David A. McClure Funeral Home last Wednesday. Interment was in Brampton Cemetery.

### FARM FORUMS

#### Farm Forums Consider Health Plan Advantages

The much discussed health plans was the topic considered by Farm Radio Forum, Monday evening, February 27th, under the heading "Paying for our Health." Forums were asked what they considered the advantages and disadvantages of government controlled plans and co-operative health plans.

Some Halton forums reporting felt a compulsory plan by the government might be cheaper and everyone would be covered. At the same time there was a possibility that some might take advantage of such a plan and be in hospital for minor ailments. Medical and dental care privileges might also be abused.

Basing their conclusions on the Halton Co-Operative Medical Services Plan some of the forums decided they were receiving satisfactory services. The plan is controlled by the people themselves but everyone is not covered.

The forum found it rather difficult to decide the proper cost per family of a complete coverage plan that would include hospital, surgical, medical and dental costs. Rates suggested ranged from ninety to one hundred and twenty five dollars a year.
