REMINISCENCES BY AG-REP. H. R. HARE

Recently we received a newsy letter from H. R. Hare, who was the 1st Agricultural Representative or District Representative for the County of Halton. The first office was opened on June 1st, 1914, over Harry Graham's shoe store in Burlington. In his reminiscences, "Bunny" paid tribute to many leaders for their splendid cooperation and assistance. Numbered among them were Elgin Harris of Burlington; the Moores, former editors at Acton and Georgetown; Mac Smith of Burlington; the late W. F. W. Fisher of Burlington, to name but a few of those mentioned. Reference was also made to the first short course held in Milton in 1915 — to the first school fair held at Hornby, where a row developed over a tug-of-war event in which some of the parents apparently couldn't resist the temptation to "help" — to a drainage demonstration down near Hornby, and states "Bunny" "farmer Galbraith sat on the fence, smoked his pipe and philosophized?" This was back in the days of the Farmers' Institute meeting, when the late Jim Wilson was president and the late Archie McNabb was secretary. On one occasion "Bunny" reports, those two gentlemen drove out to a Farmers' Institute meeting at Kilbride. It was a dark, dirty rainy night in the fall, and while the meeting was in progress some of the village wags, (perhaps to get back at the late Archie, who as most people recall, was quite a prankster himself) slipped the two front wheels of the buggy on one side and the two hind wheels on the other. Apparently Archie was the driver, because Bunny reports that they drove all the way back from Kilbride to Milton with the wheels on the side in the ditch

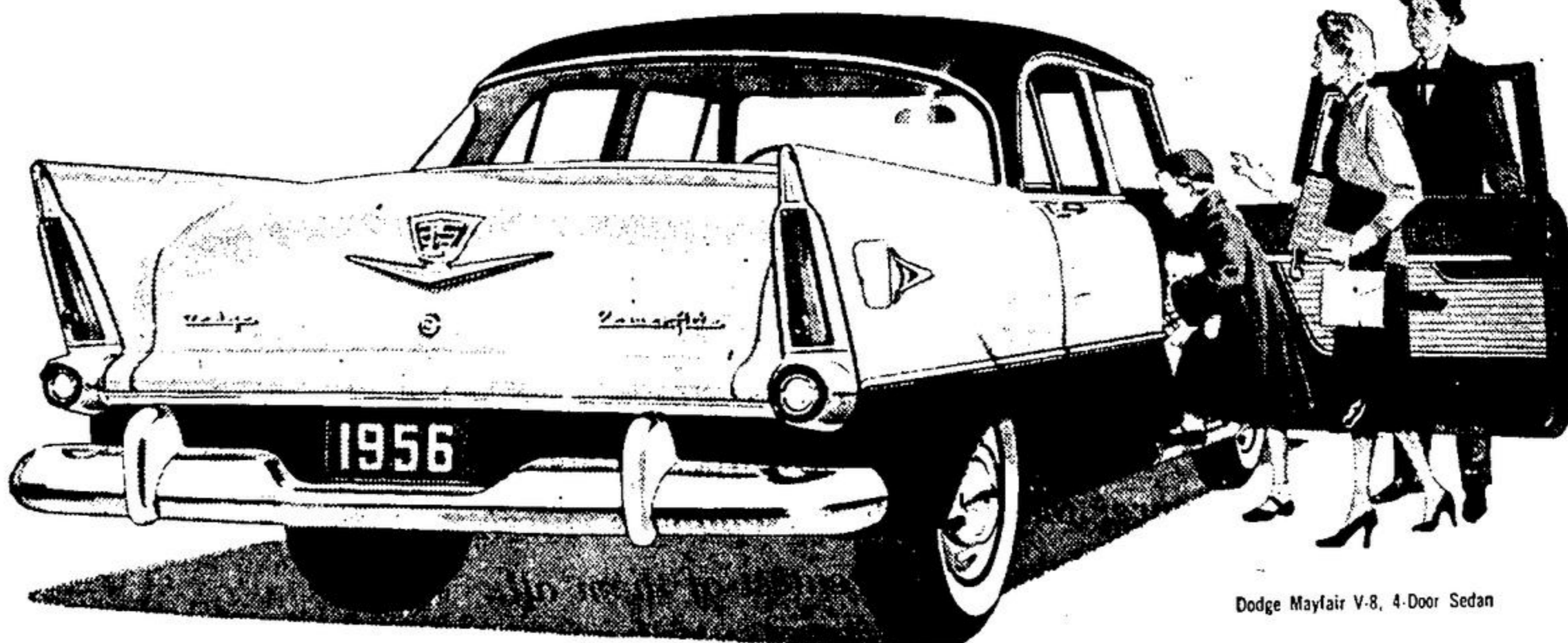
