Reference was also made to the first short course held in Milton in 1915 - to the first school fair held at Hornby, where a row developed over a tug-ofwar event in which some of the parents apparently couldn't resist the temptation to "help" - to a drainage demonstration down near Hornby, and Hates "Bunny" "farmer Galbraith sat on the fence, smoked his pipe and philosophized"? This was back in the days of the Farmers' Institute meet ing, when the late Jim Wilson was president and the late Archie Nabb was secretar.y On one occasion "Bunny" reports, those two gentlemen drove out to a Farmers' Institute meeting at Kilbride. It was a dark, dirty rainy night in the fall, and while the meeting was in progress some of the village wags, (perhaps to get back at the late Archie, who as most people around Milton district will recall, was quite a prankster himself' slipped the two front wheels of the buggy on one side and the two hind wheels on the other. Apparently Archie was the driver, because Bunny




