## FARM FORUM

### Tariff, Trade Agreement Difficult to Interpret

What support should Canadian farmers give the type of program being advanced by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (generally spoken of as GATT) was discussed on National Farm Radio Forum March 5. This policy is designed to remove as many trade barriers as possible.

Judging from reports received from Halton Farm Forum groups, the members found this a difficult subject. Some groups felt the GATT should receive our support if it were going to help the farmers but not if it would endanger the economic standing of the country. Others felt we should not support it and one group decided we had no alternative but to give it our support.

All groups agreed that problems might arise from following this policy. Some mentioned were: it might be beneficial to some types of farming and harmful to others; Surpluses might become a problem. Free trade might be beneficial if applied to all industries not agricultural products only.
