

Second in a series of messages about Delrex and what it means to the Georgetown area.

Nearly every community in Southern Ontario has experienced growth in the 10 years since the end of World War II. In many cases the growth, has been rapid. Rapid growth has brought with it many problems.

Schools become overcrowded and new schools are expensive. ..Municipal services, such as water and sewage disposal require costly enlargements. Municipal office staffs, police and fire departments need new members and this involves a higher payroll.

Since all these changes cost money, the expense must be passed along in the form of taxes. Usually, it is the home owner who suffers because industrial expansion has not equalled the growth of residential develop-

Georgetown, because of Delrex, is solving this problem the best possible way-through planning. Although Georgetown is destined to grow into a model city, the taxpayer will not have to carry an increased burden.

Delrex has been planned in such a manner that Georgetown's welfare will be protected. Water and sewer lines, including the main trunks on new roads, have all been installed at the expense of the developer, rather than at the expense of the town. School sites have been donated, roads will be surfaced and sidewalks installed. industries help keep the mill rate down because they pay regular property taxes plus a business tax. Indus-

tries have no children, so school costs don't rise with industrial development. With this in mind, Delrex has guaranteed that industrial development will keep pace with residential

Planning in this direction means Georgetown will benefit twice. Delrex will bring new wealth to the area, but costs, and taxes, will be kept under strict control.

#### Continue Farm Pond Subsidy in Halton

The annual meeting of the Halton Conservation Committee met in the agricultural office in Milton on Tuesday evening of last week. This committee, which is made up of the members of the committee on agriculture and reforestation of Halton county council, plus one o rtwo representatives each from a number of Halton farm organizations, dealt with the question of whether or not to recommend the continuance of Halton's farm pond policy, Halton's reforestation programme and the county weed problem. Incidentally the committee is recommending to county council the continuance of the farm pond policy for 1956. While a total of 162 applications have heen received under this policy, there are many folks who have taken no action since the site for their proposed pond was approv-There are a number of others who have constructed ponds but have not got them fenced to turn live subsidies will be paid on approved as secretary treasurer.
