Maple Ave. Extension Will Cost Town \$25,000

A new roadway which will join the two Maple Avenues came one step closer last week when Georgetown council ordered a construction by-law prepared for this.

The \$65,000 project would provide a much-needed new approach to downtown for residents in the eastern sections of Georgetown, a traffic artery which would funnel through traffic from No. 7 to Milton and Hamilton, and a route for children from the park district who will be attending Wrigglesworth Public School in future.

Actual cost to the town after government grants are received is estimated at \$25,000.

Town Engineer Douglas Wilson outlined how the road would be constructed, pointing out various features on a large sketch which he had prepared. He suggested a 5 foot wide sidewalk to take care of foot traffic which would be extensive, especially with a large group of children using this route to school.

It is possible that Normandy Blvd. would be left as a dead end street as there is no particular advantage in tying it into the new roadway. Residents of Normandy will be asked for their opinions on this.

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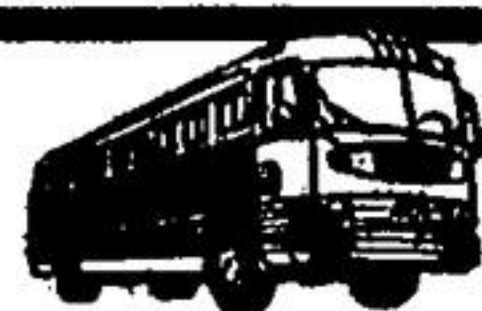

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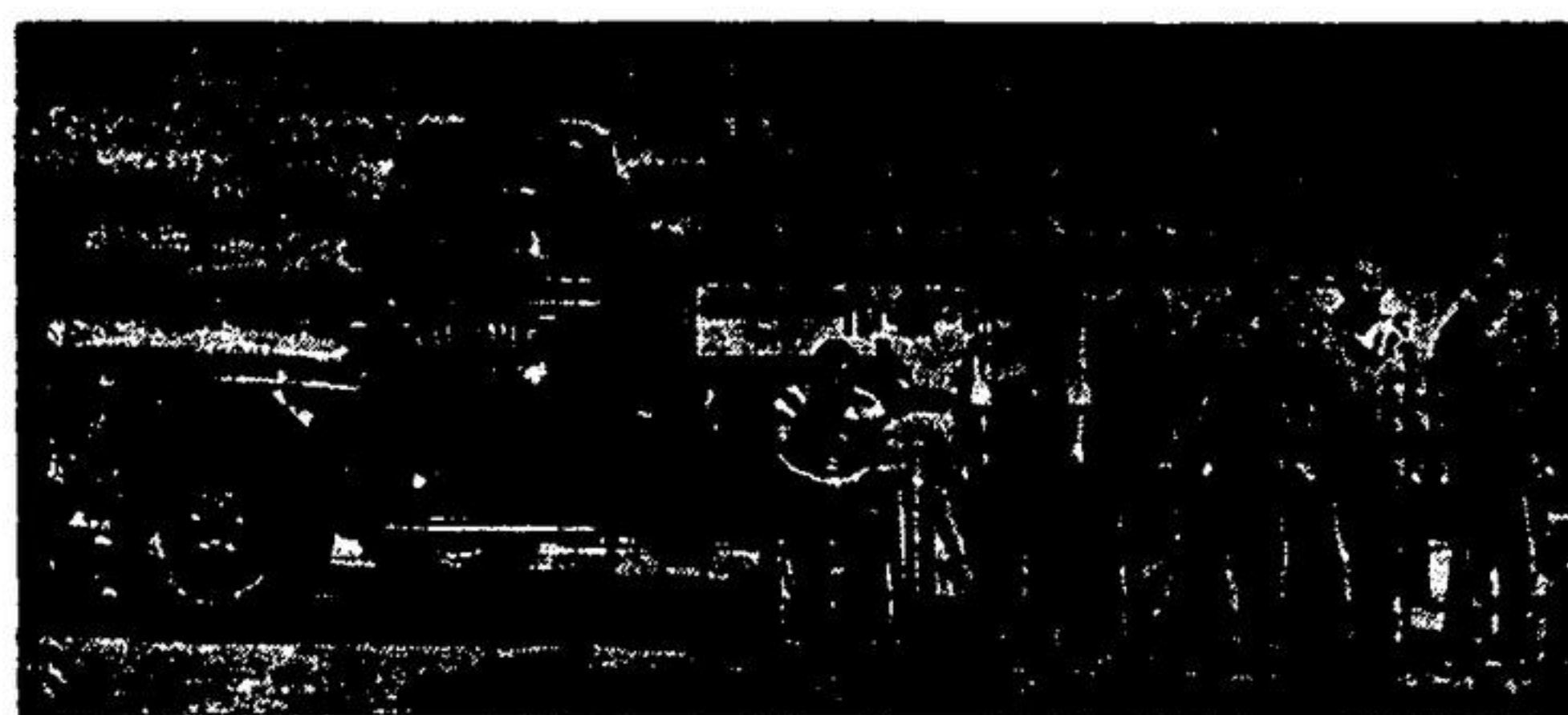
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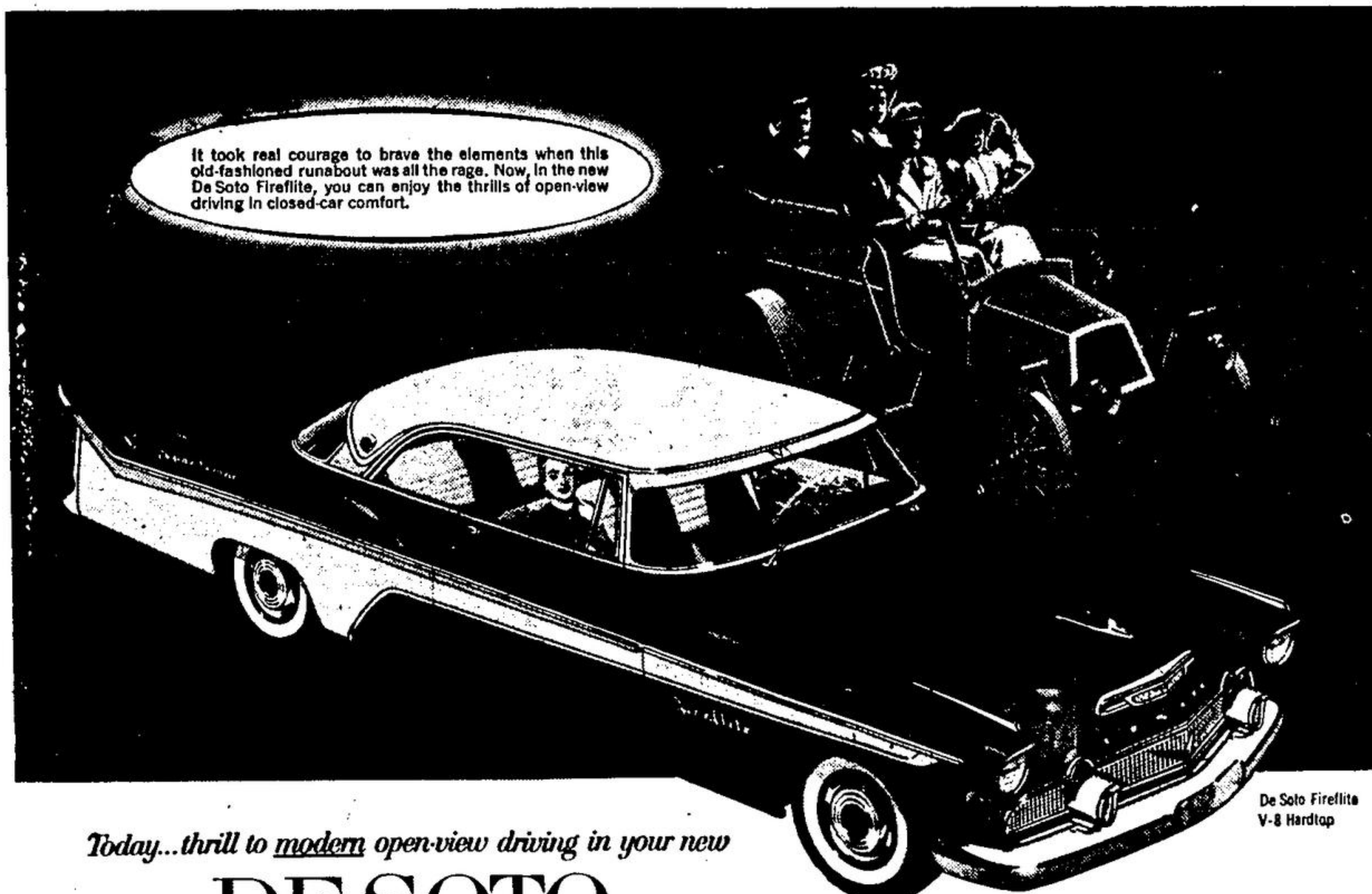
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
