New Postage Stamps In Wildlife Series

The Hon. Hugues Lapointe, postmaster general, announced details of the two new design wildlife series postage stamps that will be issued on April 12 to emphasize Canada's National Wildlife Week.

A four cent purple stamp will illustrate caribou and a five cent blue stamp will illustrate a mountain goat. Both stamps were designed by Emanuel Hahn, RCA, Toronto. In developing the designs the artist selected their outstanding characteristics and illustrated the mountain goat head only and a group of caribou in a manner which stresses their herd characteristics. Both stamps are being engraved and printed by the Canadian Bank Note Co.

By issuing these two postage stamps the post office department wishes to join with those private, provincial and federal government agencies that are striving to increase the interest in the importance of securing and restoring the wildlife resources of Canada, not only for their considerable economic value but also because they are a constant source of pleasure to thousands in every walk of life.
