PAX BIBLE CLASS OLD BOYS' REUNION

A former Georgetowner who has achieved notable success in youth work, was the subject of an article in a recent edition of the Toronto Telegram.

Here is what the Tely had to say about Mr. Alcott and the Pax Bible Class, which on two occasions has conducted services in Georgetown churches.

Gordon Alcott is a soft-spoken, bespectacled man who has devoted more than 25 years of his life to youth work.

In his day, Mr. Alcott has coached amateur teams in hockey, baseball and football from the Pee Wee level right to senior teams. He is also the president of the Little NHL.

But never in his long career working with youngsters has he ever been associated with a keener, more enthusiastic group than the Pax Bible Class, of Weston Presbyterian Church.

The Pax Bible Class is Mr. Alcott's baby, a baby that has grown steadily since birth.

More than 140 young people ranging in age from 13 to 22 meet regularly at Creelman Hall to further their religious and secular education—and have fun doing it.

The Telegram visited Creelman Hall recently to get a first-hand picture of what makes the Pax Bible Class one of the most active and enthusiastic young people's groups in Metropolitan Toronto.

The answer can be given in one word—spirit.

On every one of the many class projects, grade school pupils work together with their older brothers and sisters in high school and young people who have left their school. Age makes no difference—that you are a member of the class is enough.

Every Sunday at 10 a.m. the class meets to study the life of Paul. The non-denominational morning meetings end in time for members to attend services in the churches of their choice.

Once a month the class takes over an entire evening service at the church. Mr. Alcott delivers the sermon, class members take up the collection, act as ushers and form the choir.

Before the monthly church services, members hold a Bee Cee (before church) dinner.

Members bring the food, prepare it and serve it and clean up afterwards. The entire proceeds of the dinners go to further various class projects. Last year they were able to build a new fireplace in the manse and turn over \$500 in cash to the church.

After one party, 1,000 cans of food were turned over to the Scott Mission—enough to help feed 200 families for two weeks.

"The whole idea of the class is to have every member actively participate in some aspect of our activities," Mr. Alcott said.

Members take turns reading from the Scriptures at the monthly church service. Others direct and produce class plays and skits. Some handle the business details.

But apart from all the social activities, members receive a firm grounding in the Bible by taking an active part in the study periods.

While the majority of the youngsters are residents of Weston, many come from other parts of Metropolitan Toronto.

Since it began, 11 years ago, with only 12 members, more than 1,000 Toronto teenagers have graduated from the Pax Bible Class.

One member, Craig Cribar, a former class president, has gone on to study for the ministry. Another plans to become a medical missionary.

On March 11th, the class held its first Old Boys' Reunion and many of its graduates now living all across the province came back for the celebration.

A good deal of this exhibition is turned over to the crafts, such as sculpture, textile and metal work.

Also in the Art Gallery this Sunday, starting at 3 o'clock, you'll be able to hear the last of their Sunday concerts. This program will be made up of Easter music and will be performed by the Collegium Musicum under the direction of Udo Kasenets. The group was formed in 1954 and consists of twenty-two highly skilled musicians who are much praised for their playing of the lesser heard classics and contemporary works. Admission here, as with the Art Gallery in general, is free.

New Postage Stamps in Wildlife Series

The Hon. Hugues Lapointe, postmaster general, announced details of the two new design wildlife series postage stamps that will be issued on April 12 to emphasize Canada's National Wildlife Week.

A four cent purple stamp will illustrate caribou and a five cent blue stamp will illustrate a mountain goat. Both stamps were designed by Emanuel Hahn, RCA, Toronto. In developing the designs the artist selected their outstanding characteristics and illustrated the mountain goat head only and a group of caribou in a manner which stresses their herd characteristics. Both stamps are being engraved and printed by the Canadian Bank Note Co.

By issuing these two postage stamps the post office department wishes to join with those private, provincial and federal government agencies that are striving to increase the interest in the importance of securing and restoring the wildlife resources of Canada, not only for their considerable economic value but also because they are a constant source of pleasure to thousands in every walk of life.
