## William Bullivant, 73 Resident Since Boyhood

A lifelong resident of Esqueving, William Isaac Bullivant died last Thursday at his home on Charles St. He was in his 74th year, and had been in ill-health for some years.

One of a family of twelve, Mr. Bullivant was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Bullivant. Although born in Hornby, his family moved to Georgetown when he was a little boy. In his youth, Mr. Bullivant played lacrosse for the Georgetown team. He had also been an active member of the Orange Lodge, Royal Oak Chapter LOL 245, for many years, acting in the capacity of secretary-treasurer. He was a member of St. George's Anglican Church.

Fifty-one years ago he married Harriet Hargreaves of Yorkshire, England, and the family held a celebration of their golden wedding anniversary last October. Mr. Bullivant was employed for some time at the Arnold glove factory which used to be in town, and he also worked for the C. B. Dayfoot Company for many years. Before he retired due to ill health, Mr. Bullivant worked for J. B. Mackenzie and Son and W. H. Kentner and Son in the building business.

There are several brothers and sisters surviving: Mrs. Thomas Bouksill (Florence), Georgetown; Thomas of Hamilton; Mrs. Joseph Mulholland (Mabel), Toronto; Mrs. Daisy Willis, Toronto; and Fred of Georgetown.

Mr. Bullivant also leaves his wife and two sons and 3 daughters, Harold of Georgetown; Mrs. Eileen Schrag, Montreal; Mrs. Gordon Pass (Louise), Preston; Mrs. William Clements (Edith), Toronto; and William, Georgetown. There are three grandchildren, Peter and David Pass, Preston, and Patricia of Montreal.

Rev. Kenneth Richardson of St. George's Anglican Church conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home on Saturday afternoon at 1.30. Pallbearers were two sons-in-law, Gordon Pass and William Clements; two grandsons, David and Peter Pass, and two nephews, Isaac and Arthur Bullivant of Hamilton. The interment took place in Greenwood Cemetery.

The funeral was largely attended with relatives present from London, Ontario, Preston, Toronto, Milton, Hamilton, Otterville, Montreal, Ottawa, Brampton and Hespeler.

## Farmers Oppose Gas Line Angle Crossing

A group of Esqueving farmers, represented by George Elliott, QC, Milton, attended a hearing called by the Ontario Fuel Board in Milton Monday, to suggest modifications in location of the pipeline which will serve Georgetown, Acton and Milton with natural gas supplied by United Suburban Gas Co.

The plan presented to the board by lawyer John Evans for the granting of a certificate of convenience and necessity, cut through many farms at an angle, and Mr. Elliott suggested for his clients that it would be more acceptable to have the pipeline follow the CNR and other right-of-ways, and the old radial property wherever possible.

Aware that future housing subdivisions may come of farmland in the suburban area, farmers fear that complications will arise if the gas pipeline angles through their properties.

While some district farmers have signed agreements with United Suburban allowing this to happen, several have refused to sign the proposed agreement, although they are agreeable to a modified plan which would locate the pipeline along fence lines.

The fuel board, chaired by A. R. Crozier, reserved decision Monday, and will look over the territories which the pipeline will serve. Another meeting was called for next week, when the company was asked to submit a plan which might be more acceptable to farmers whose lands will be crossed.
