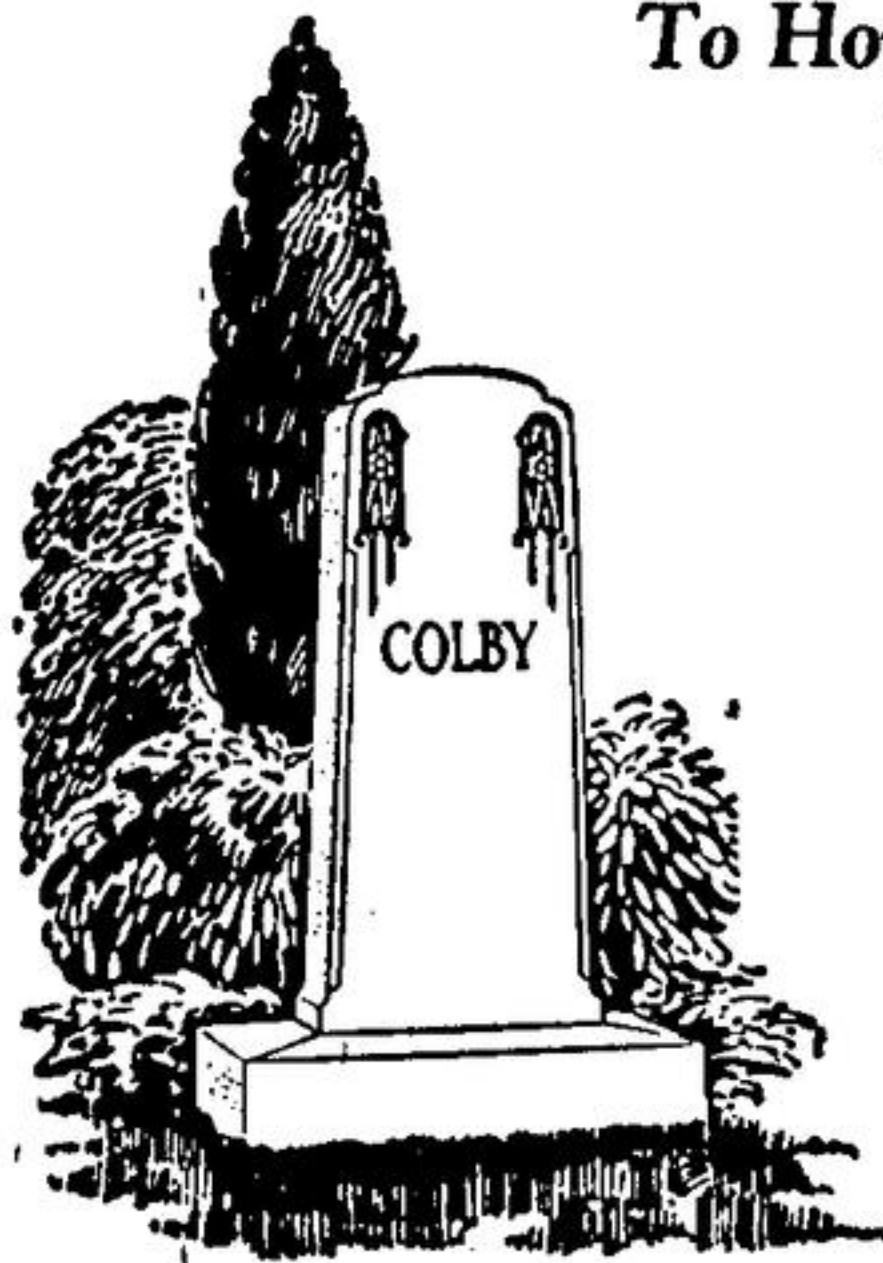

**HEAD-ON CRASH KILLS
BRAMPTON RADIO HEAD**

Owner of Brampton radio station CFJB, Fenwick Job, 38 was killed instantly in a motor accident Friday night on Highway 10 four miles south of Brampton.

The head on crash occurred in a snowstorm when a pick-up truck driven by Hugh McArthur, Inglewood collided with Mr. Job's car.

With Mr. Job were his wife and his four children. Mrs. Job suffered possible internal injuries, a cut leg and head injuries. Murray, 2 received face cuts and Barbara, 7 a fractured leg, concussion and shock. Two other children, Keryl, 10 and Valerie, 5, escaped with shock.

Job was an expert in almost every field of radio. He was born in Winnipeg, son of the late W. Fenton Job, and began his radio career at Port Huron. He later worked at stations in Hamilton, Timmins, Montreal and Toronto as announcer and became national sales manager of CKEY. He became editor of the Peel Gazette in Brampton for a short time, and late in 1953 founded the town's radio station.

CFJB became one of the foremost stations in Canada, winning the top Canadian award for outstanding community service during Hurricane Hazel.

Mr. Job was serving his second year on the town council, was active in Lions Club work and a member of the Liberal party.

He served as a pilot officer in the RCAF during World War II. Surviving besides his widow, the former Audrey Harley, are a brother, Lockley of Richmond Hill and a half-brother, Kenneth Job in Islington.
