last Tuesday in the municipal building Harold Bairstow, new president of the Chamber, in his inaugural speech, suggested that merchants combine for some sort of campaign and outlined possible avenues of approach.

Suggesstions included issue of gift certificates with purchases, with such certificates redeemable in merchanrise at any participating store, such campaign to last two or three weeks. Another idea was to have a weekly lucky draw, for which shoppers would receive chances with each purchase.

Mr. Bairstow also suggested that merchants might issue a shopping guide which would list all services available in Georgetown and would be very helpful to new residents of town who are not familiar with local stores and businesses.

Preparation of an industrial brochure, would, however, be a Chamber activity, and would be a project which would be helpful to the town in general whose lifeblood depends on industrial activity.

The question of night depositories in the two local banks was discussed. Jim Alcorn and Dick Miller, representing the Bank of Commerce and Royal Bank said this would involve an outlay of over \$4,000 to each bank and that service charges would be perhaps \$10 or \$15 yearly.

Enough customers would have to he assured to make this a paying proposition for the banks, and they were asked to draw up a questionnaire for interested parties. A number of merchants present indicated they would be interested in safeguarding money taken in after banking hours in this

Retiring president John Gunn reviewed last year's activities before vacating the chair for the incoming

president. Mr. Gunn said the Chamber had tried to find a solution for parking problems downtown but had run into snags in getting prices for properties under consideration. A council-ratepayers committee is presently working along the same line, seeking a large central parking area which would provide accommodation for the
