Brampton - Town Return Walk for 87th Birthday

A walk to Georgetown for an 87-year-old Brampton man had complications yesterday when directions were confused and he started back home before a planned picture for the Brampton Conservator was snapped.

The mistake was rectified in the afternoon when editor Bill Doole and a photographer met G. A. Thompson, who was well on his return walk to Brampton, brought him back to Georgetown for a photo, then left him on the highway to continue his walking marathon.

It was Mr. Thompson's 87th birthday and the non-smoking, non-drinking resident of 58 Jessie St. celebrated in this unusual way.

The Herald was alerted to watch for the visitor, who left Brampton at 9 a.m. on the 22-mile trip. Word of his progress reached the office at 11.30 in a report by a man driving along No. 7 who offered him a ride at the top of Norval hill, and was told the details by Mr. Thompson.

When he had not arrived at the office by mid-afternoon, the Herald staff was worried, then by accident, Fran Deans of the post office staff was in the office and mentioned that Mr. Taylor had called at the post office to confirm his appearance in town at 1.20 and had started for home.

Mayor Jack Armstrong, who had been asked to pose for a picture with the hiker was contacted again, and the Brampton paper rushed their photographer over for the picture of Mr. Thompson being greeted by the mayor.

Mr. Thompson is a spry little man who belies his 87 years. When offered a chair at the Herald office, he declined, with the comment that he has always worked at a stand-up job, and wasn't the least bit out of puff. Recently he submitted a design for a Canadian flag to the secretary of state, and it will likely be discussed at Ottawa soon.
