Nelson Trafford, a member of the Toronto city police force for five years will be Georgetown's fifth policeman.

One of 23 applicants for a position as probationary constable, he was hired after an interview Monday night. Mr. Trafford was one of seven candidates chosen for interview for the \$2700 position which will boost the town police force from 4 to 5 men. Mr. Trafford will serve with Police Chief Roy Haley and Constables James Bilsborrow, Clifford Found and Forrest Inch, who have been on the job since the town replaced provincial police with its own force a year ago.

Mr. Trafford, a native of Ottawa, will begin his new job on June 1st. He has been a motorcycle traffic by Beaver Ready-Mixed Co. working officer and has also served with the under contract. Council passed a \$718 payment to Credit Valley Conservation Authority, representing the town's share of the 1956 budget.

The Authority will spend \$20,000 this year, half of which comes from the government and the other half from the various municipalities involved. Major items in the budget are \$4,000 for reforestation, \$6500 for parks and \$4,000 flood control.

Reeve Allen suggested that the condition of the papermill dam be brought to the authority's attention as there is repair work needed. Council decided to ask Alex Maclaren, who serves the town on the board, to the next meeting to discuss this and other conservation questions.

Halton Co-Operative Enters Oil, Gas Business

Halton Co-operative Supplies is entering the gas and oil business next week, with purchase of a new truck which will be delivering gasoline, fuel oil and similar supplies. Storage tanks have been installed behind the company's mill and sales

office on Guelph St., as well as at the company's Milton depot. The Co-Op is supplying round alumium-painted tanks for farm cus-

tomers, to store a product which has become so essential in farm operations. They are designed to cut evaporation loss as much as possible. Decision of Co-Op directors to en-

ter the oil and gas field was endorsed at the annual meeting of the organization recently at Stewarttown, when the new move was first made public by W. H. Smellie, general manager of the company which conducts business in Georgetown and Milton.

Georgetown council discussed engaging a firm of consulting engineers to plan a future new sewage disposal plant at their meeting on Monday. Names of six possible firms were given by Douglas Wilson, town engineer, and the public works committee was empowered to go into the

matter. While no definite decision has been taken on a new plant, it is expected that when the industrial area of Delrex is built up, the present treatment plant will not be adequate to take care of the town's needs.

So sure is the Delrex company of this, that they are planning to spend some \$40,000 in installing a pumping station at the edge of the industrial section, to be ready when the time

Council was asked to approve this project Monday, their okay being necessary before the company can go through the necessary procedure with the Dept. of Health. Cr. Harry Hale explained that it would mean no money out of the town treasury.

Cr. LeRoy Dale said he could see no particular reason for the pump station at the present time, and that he would favour no talk about a new sewage disposal plant until he could see signs of industrial building in Delrex. He voted against the mo-

Engineer Wilson suggested that council consider some sort of by-law governing industrial waste disposal, in order to safeguard present or future sewage plants from trouble caus-

ed by toxic wastes. Certain industries, such as packing plants, tanneries, plating or paper processing can play havoe with a sewerage system, he said, unless waste products are required to be pretreated.

A policy has been adopted which will require property owners to pay charges of fixing stopped sewer lines if investigation proves that the stoppage is on private property.

Ray Berg asked about the possibility of opening Cherry St., which adjoins his property on Kennedy St. The engineer and road committee were instructed to ascertain costs of water and sewer services if this were

When Cr. Irwin Noble suggested that "U" turns on Main St. be prehibited, Cr. Alf Sykes said this was one of several recommendations made by the police chief which will be studied by the police committee and brought before council at a later date. Mr. Sykes said he had drawn to the chief's attention a letter sent to council by Dr. Charles Sayers about a dog-catching incident, and that the chief had dealt with the matter in a satisfactory manner.
