Louisa Morrison, 86 Was Registered Nurse

Member of a well-known Georgetown district family, Louisa Morrison, Reg. N., died in Hamilton on Sunday, April 15th, after a long illness.
Miss Morrison, daughter of the late Hugh and Ann Morrison, was born in Tullamore on July 3rd, 86 years ago. In the year 1876 the Morrison family moved to Ashgrove where they purchased a farm. Miss Morrison grew up there and when she was seventeen became organist and choirleader at St. John's Church, Stewarttown. She served the church in that capacity for 17 years, giving it up only when she decided to go into training as a nurse in the Toronto General Hospital. After her graduation from the hospital, she did private nursing, continuing her career after her father retired from the farm and built the Morrison home on Charles St. in Georgetown. At that time the late Miss Morrison and her sister, Miss Loretta, were the only members of the family living at home.
Of the family of eight children, there are two surviving, Miss Loretta Maple Avenue, and Fred who still lives on the farm homestead at Ashgrove. The other brothers and sisters, James, Rachel (Mrs. Ben Harrop) Dr. William of Toronto, Ernest and Percy all predeceased their sister.
The funeral service took place on Wednesday afternoon at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. Rev. Kenneth Richardson of St. George's Anglican Church took the service. Six nephews were pallbearers: Roy Harrop, Brampton; Alan Harrop, Norval; Fred Morrison, Cooksville; Earl Treleaven, Georgetown; Len Cox, R.R. 2 Georgetown, and Clare Ford, Milton. The interment was made in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.
