Raiders Eliminated from Intermediate Playoffs

Meaford Knights outscored and outskated a leg-weary Raider team last Wednesday evening in Collingwood to win 6-3 and take their hockey play-off series four games to two. The game got away to a fast start with both teams seeking to gain an early advantage. Poor shooting by the Raiders forwards and the close checking of the Meaford defence kept the Georgetowners disorganized and enabled the Knights to grab a first period 2-1 lead.

Play in the second period was close with each team waiting for a break. Midway through the period Meaford scored to take a 3-1 lead. Worthy of mention was the play of little Kozarian on the Knights defence. He effectively stalled the Georgetown attack when Meaford were two men short because of penalties.

The third period was only a few minutes old when Blake Inglis scored for the Raiders to close the gap. However the pace was beginning to tell on the team. Play became ragged as the time moved on. A needless penalty to Bud Vacey of Georgetown was the signal for a power play by the Knights which netted them two goals and the game. The final goal came in the last two minutes of play. Final score Meaford Knights 6, Georgetown Raiders 3.

Three stars of the evening for Georgetown were Inglis, Voyer and Rhodes. The latter played a steady game in goal despite noticeable lack of defence at times.

Meaford enters the finals for the O.H.A. Intermediate A crown against the winner of the Sundridge-Exeter play-off.

Teacher at the Old Georgetown Academy

A former teacher at the Academy which was located on Academy Road in the section of town known as College View, many many years ago, Helen O. Pugh, died in Hamilton on Tuesday, April 10th, in her 92nd year.

Miss Pugh and her sister Emily, who predeceased her in 1927, lived in Georgetown for a great many years. For a time they lived in their home on Queen Street, but for the most part made their home in a house on Victoria Avenue. The sisters were natives of England. In 1943 Miss Pugh went to live in the Brampton Home for the Aged, and later became an occupant of the Halton Centennial Manor. She had been hospitalized only a short time prior to her death. There are no known surviving relatives.
