THREE SEEK COUNCIL SEAT AT BRAMPTON

Walter O. Misener, who retired this year as district manager of the Bell Telephone Co. is one of three candidates for a Brampton council seat which will be decided in a by-election April 21st.

The council vacancy was caused by the death of Fenwick Job, owner of radio station CFJB, who was killed in an auto crash recently.

Mr. Misener now operates Peel Credit & Collection Agency.

Also in the running are William M. Robinson, manager of the Brampton Lumber Co. and Edward J. Fobert, TCA controller.

All three were candidates in the December elections.

Mr. Robinson lost out in the mayoralty race to Mayor Nance Horwood. Mr. Misener and Mr. Fobert were unsuccessful candidates for council.

ONTARIO ELECTION COST \$2,083,611

Roderick Lewis, chief Ontario election officer and clerk of the legislature, says the cost of the provincial election last June was \$2,083,611 — \$1.18 for each voter.

This was about nine cents more per voter than the cost in the 1951 election. Mr. Lewis said 1,761,525 votes were cast last year out of an eligible list of 2,905,760.

There were more votes polled in 1951 despite the fact there were eight new electoral districts in 1955. Only 60.61 per cent of the eligible voters cast ballots last year, the lowest percentage since 1943 when the percentage was 57.88.
