**Mrs. John O'Neill, Well-Known Resident**

Known widely for quiet acts of kindness and one of Georgetown's most respected residents, Mrs. John N. O'Neill, 91, died suddenly at her home, 8 Wesleyan St. on Friday afternoon.

While her sister, Mrs. Charlotte Thompson, Embro, was visiting, Mrs. O'Neill complained of not feeling well, layed down on a couch and while Mrs. Thompson was in the kitchen to get her a cup of tea, death occurred.

Mrs. O'Neill had been blessed with the good health to enjoy life right to the end. She maintained her own home and kept busy with her housework and shopping, sharing her friendly personality with those with whom she came in contact.

Elizabeth Jane Coventry before her marriage in 1892, she was the daughter of James and Mary Ann Coventry and was born on the 3rd Line West, Chinguacousy.

Mrs. O'Neill lived in Altona when they were first married, moving to Georgetown in 1899 when he purchased the carriage shop of Culp & McKenzie. He became one of the town's leading businessmen, branching into the auto agency and garage business as time progressed. In 1922, fire destroyed his building and the present large structure on Main St. in which Carroll's store is located was built to replace it.

Mrs. O'Neill continued in business until shortly before his death in 1949.

Mrs. O'Neill was very active in church work at St. John's United, where she was a member of the Woman's Association and a life member of the Women's Missionary Society. She was also a member of Georgetown Women's Institute.

Surviving are two children, Arol J. O'Neill, Toronto and Melrose, Mrs. Earle D. Sheley, Birmingham, Michigan; four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren; her sister, Miss Addie Coventry, 30 Church St., and two half-sisters, Mrs. Martha McInnis, Markdale and Mrs. Charlotte Thompson, Embro.

Rev. Morgan McFarlane conducted the funeral service on Monday at the Harold C. McClure funeral home, with interment following in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Orval Rayner, Norman Bird, James F. Evans, William G. Marshall, Wheldon Emmerson and George H. Leslie.
