Housewives Important
In New Car Purchases

Canada's housewives have emerged as important factors in the automobile market, a survey conducted by a leading manufacturer discloses.

In checking the first four months' sales of its 1956-model vehicles, market research analysts of Chrysler Corporation of Canada, Limited learned that the Canadian housewife stands eighth in 64 categories of occupations as a purchaser of the company's cars.

In first place, as might be expected, are salesmen, closely followed by taxicab operators. Corporations which buy cars for employee use are third. Other groups, in order, in the first 10 are: laborers and workmen, farmers, merchants, managers, housewives, clerks and contractors.

The Chrysler survey covered purchases of all lines manufactured by the company, ranging from the lowest-priced Plymouth and Dodge automobiles to the most luxurious Imperial models.

"Our company has long recognized the influence of women upon automobile purchases," commented C. O. Hurley, vice-president in charge of sales. "However, this survey now confirms this definite trend toward increased ownership of cars by women."

The survey also indicates, Mr. Hurley added, importance of the automobile in the country's economic life as reflected by purchases by salesmen, public transportation companies and workmen.

HISTORY OF THE
AG-REP SERVICE

1957 will see the fiftieth anniversary of the agricultural representative service. A few months ago we were requested to write up something on the Halton County office since its inception back in 1914. Frankly we haven't got the job done, but periodically we have delved back into office records, and frankly we have come across some interesting information. The "Rep" office was opened on June 1, 1914, in Burlington, with H. R. Hare in charge. When "Bunny" enlisted for Overseas service, W. F. Strong took over. He was followed by R. R. Fleming in late 1919, and in the early part of the next year, the office was moved to Milton. Then on June 1st, 1927, came D. A. Andrew, who remained only one year. Then came Alex. P. MacVannel for a two-year stay, to be followed by A. G. Kirstine for a four-year term. The writer succeeded the energetic "Shorty" on October 1, 1934. As you know, we are still here — but how much longer, if the present trend in real estate deals keeps up, we are beginning to wonder. We came across a rather ambiguous and interesting statement in the annual report of the office for the year 1917. It referred to a tractor rental policy which the Ontario Department of Agriculture sponsored at that time, in connection with the war effort to increase food production. Here is the statement in question, and we quote: "The Tractor Company has used us on the square at all times. They have been slow in sending out repairs and they have had a tendency to bill us for repairs we never purchased." Can you figure that one out?
