WHAT COUNCIL DID

REVISED INSURANCE PROGRAM FOR ALL MUNICIPAL BUILDINGS

Sweeping changes in insurance on public buildings administered by the council were made on Monday when council heard a lengthy report submitted by E. L. Millar, speaking for the Western British American insurance group.

Council endorsed his proposal and will place the business through local agents Walter T. Evans & Co. and the John R. Barber Agency. Barber and James F. Evans accompanied Mr. Miller to the meeting to help explain details of the new set-up.

The approximate \$120,000 valuation placed on buildings includes major items of \$61,000 on the municipal building and \$40,000 on the fire

Savings in premiums have been ef fected through co-insurance and by taking a 3-year policy split into annual payments. Total cost of the policy which will eventually replace a number of separate policies placed at various times on town buildings, will be only slightly higher than the present insurance premiums.

A deputation from the Rotary Club John Gunn, Jim Ritchie and Ralph Ursel, asked that clay be added to the park racetrack prior to the harness meet in June. The property committee and town engineer were delegated to see what can be done to improve the track.

Richard Vandenburg left the meet ing still unsatisfied in one of several appearances to request approval for a group of stores which he plans to erect on Guelph St.

Okayed at one stage, his plan hit a stumbling block last week when it was found council had misinterpreted the meaning of a right-of-way for fire protection over neighbour Fred Rossproperty.

Mr. Vandenburg said he now plans to drop one store from the building, which would leave a rear entranceway for the time being to satisfy council demands. He was told to submit this to the new planning board, while Cr. Alfred Sykes said that he thought the applicant should have satisfaction soon, as his plans have been stalled so many times.

Mr. Ross was present to tell council that he does not believe a service road at the rear of his property, where he also plans a store building, is sensible at present. While he thinks all highway frontage will be commercial eventually, there is still residential property whose owners could not be expected to deed land for such a road, he said.

Ray Berg asked again about opening Cherry St. and was told by Cr. Walter Gray that he expects to present such a motion at the next council meeting.
