Bert Parr Former Georgetown Reeve

After a lengthy illness of over five years Albert Benjamin Parr died at his home, 33 Queen Street on Tuesday, April 24th. Mr. Parr who was the son of David Parr and Mary Jane Hartwell was born at Alloa. He attended school there later moving to Georgetown where he was employed as a tinsmith with the W. C. Anthony hardware store and when the store was sold to Ray Thompson he continued his position. Seventeen years ago he moved to Sudbury where he was employed with Humphrey Tinsmithing and Plumbing Company, returning to Georgetown three years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Parr were married twenty-six years ago. Mrs. Parr was the former Ina Campbell. Although Mr. Parr died in his sixty-first year he had lived a very full and busy life. He was a member of the United Church and was active on the Board both in Georgetown and Sudbury. He was Reeve of Georgetown in 1936 and served many years as a

member of the municipal council. He was an ardent Odd Fellow, serving as recording secretary of Orion Lodge for many years and also as D.D.G.M. of the district in 1925.

A veteran of the first world war, first with the 164th battalion, later transferring to the P.P.C.L.I. he was a member of the Canadian Legion. He also served on the Georgetown Fire Brigade.

Mr. Parr is survived by his wife, Ina; three brothers Wilfred, Guelph; George, Malton; Jack, Orillia; one sister Violet Mahood at Kincardine. He was predeceased by one sister Sarah Ellen Armstrong, the mother of Mayor John T. Armstrong.

Funeral service was conducted from the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith Street, Thursday, April 26th. Rev. Morgan McFarlane and Rev. Alex Calder conducted the service. Pallbearers were W. G. Marshall, Ray Thompson, Wilfred Breen, Jesse Brandford, Harry Savings all of Georgetown and Wilmot Mahood of Kincardine. The four flower bearers were two nephews Roy and Morris Mahood of Kincardine and two grand-nephews Paul and Michael Armstrong of Georgetown. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery.

Tragic Conference End As Fire Destroys Church

A few hours after 500 members of the Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen from Niagara diocese had attended a banquet which concluded a two-day meeting, fire destroyed part of Grace Anglican Church, St. Catharines early Sunday. The sacristy, vestry and church offices were destroyed along with church vessels and vestments in the \$60,000 blaze which firemen battled for two hours before it was brought under control.

Rev. Kenneth Richardson and a group of Georgetown and Glen Williams men were at the banquet to hear Most Reverend W. E. Barfoot, primate of all Canada, who outlined the ministry of the laity dealing with public relations, intensified evangelism and stressed that their witness must be regular.
