THE QUALITIES OF CHINCHILLA FUR

In reply to the three articles about the chinchilla industry which appeared at the end of March in The Globe and Mail:

During the past year some 10,155 chinchilla pelts were sold in New York for \$338,924.44. This was about twice the volume sold the previous year. Although the first year's sales were more or less on a "sample" and "order-in-hand" basis, the past year has shown sales of as high as 1,266 and 1,500 to one customer.

According to the U.S. Testing Co. Inc., in its reports numbered 73547, 73616 and B1-2675, the wearing quality of chinchilla fur is superior to mink and ermine in durability, fading, edge abrasion and flex abrasion. In bursting strength, chinchilla was superior to both mink and ermine across the back but was somewhat weaker across the neck.

In New York and other fashion centres of the world, many of the top echelon fur houses are working with chinchilla and — rather than giving it up as a "useless fur" — are becoming more and more enthusiastic as they gradually discover the best ways to work the fur. Among those who are still very interested in its possibilities are Ritter, Maximilian, Revillon, Bergdorf-Goodman, Esther Dorothy, Ben Kahn, Frischman and Gintel, Henri-Bendel, Russek's, Jack Stern, Norman Hartnell, John Cavanagh, Givenchy, Jacques Heim, Mingolini, Gugenheim and Sybil Connolly. The attitude of these people is that they are willing to give the fur a fair trial before venturing any positive opinions.

One only has to look at the improvements in design, quality and dressing that have taken place during the past two years to realize what can be done with the fur within a few

more years.

Twenty years ago there was not one furrier in Toronto who would buy ranch mink—they claimed its quality would never equal that of wild mink and it just did not have any place in the trade. How fortunate for the mink rancher and the fur trade in general that the leaders in New York and other centres of the world had the foresight to thoroughly investigate the possibilities of ranch mink while the Toronto furriers were busy beating their breasts and shouting from the house-tops that the fur was no good. Surely history is not going to repeat itself.
