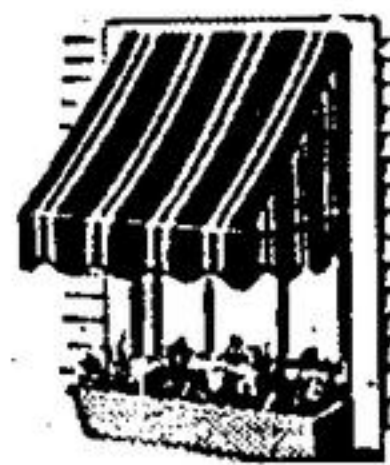

Chamber Sparks Action Local Shopping Campaign

An interesting project of the Chamber of Commerce is taking place this week, with various merchants being interviewed to get their views and enlist support for a shopping campaign.

Non-retail members of the Chamber are doing the ground work for what is hoped will be a beneficial idea to boost local shopping. Another project presently under discussion is the feasibility of making a survey and analysis of shoppers in Georgetown area to find out why and how many people shop out of town.

Several committees within the Chamber were set up at last week's meeting in the municipal building, and the following were appointed as chairmen: Jack Crichton, industrial;

Dick Licata, civic; Jim Alcorn, membership; Art Scott, finance; Charles Harris, agriculture; Fred Helson, publicity. The chairman of the retail group will be appointed at the next meeting of the Chamber on Tuesday, May 22nd.

A great deal of interest was shown by all the members in the publication of a Shoppers Guide which would be a directory to all the shops and services available in the town and surrounding areas, together with a map to show where they are and how to get there.

Played Hockey and Lacrosse at Norval

Seriously ill for two weeks, Carl Raymond Sedore, 15, died in Toronto General Hospital on April 22nd. The young former resident of Norval took suddenly ill at his home at Riverview, near Shelburne, and after a day in Orangeville Hospital was taken to Toronto where medical science could do nothing for the painful illness he had contracted.

Born at Brown Hill, Carl was a baby when the family moved to Erindale. When he was six, they moved to Norval where his father operated the White Rose garage. He attended public school there, and was a popular young athlete, playing hockey and lacrosse with Georgetown and Norval teams.

The family moved to Riverview in October, 1954, and he completed his public schooling there, then attended Shelburne High School until illness forced him to quit. He continued his athletic activities at Riverview, and was playing hockey with a team there last winter.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Sedore, and brothers and sisters, Lloyd, Jr. and Geoffrey at home; Mrs. N. Tweedy (Lucille) Georgetown; Mrs. G. Hendry (Esther) and Dale of Erindale; and Mrs. C. Dale (Eileen) of Woodhill; and a nephew, Ronald Tweedy, Georgetown.

Rev. J. E. Maxwell, Norval, conducted the funeral service Wednesday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, Georgetown, with interment following in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.
