### House Moving Okayed From Highway Sites

Continued development of East Guelph Street commercially was implied Monday night when council okayed two requests for moving houses which face the highway onto lots facing Prince Charles Drive.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

W. G. Sutherland, 184 Guelph St., was granted permission to move his house to the rear of his lot, giving in exchange a triangle of land which is blocking continuation of Prince Charles into Delrex. Permission was needed because, although the back lot exceeds the area required by the building by-law, it has a narrow 20 foot frontage. Mr. Sutherland said he would be putting the house far enough back to have an actual 53 foot frontage.

Wm. B. Hamilton, whose house at 160 Guelph St. is beside the IGA, was given permission to move it to a lot on the south side of Prince Charles almost opposite Mr. Sutherland's new location. Although this lot has 77 ft. frontage, its 4200 square feet is under the 5000 limit of the building by-law.

Council okayed a recommendation of the new Planning Board concerning regulations for commercial properties, requiring a 20 ft, entranceway if such building abuts a residence, and a 20 ft. laneway at the rear to be deeded to the town. . A \$200 grant was also made to the new

Council was informed by the two local banks of an increase in interest rate to 434 Ce.

Town clerk John D. Kelly reported further reason for fencing the sewage disposal property, which has been ordered. He had been told that a youngster riding on the agitator had caught his foot, and while only suffering a bruise, his boot had been torn to shreds

The clerk was instructed to ascercreek flats and back of Oueen St.


