First Natural Gas Lines Laid Yesterday

First lines were laid yesterday for Georgetown's natural gas distribution system which United Suburban Gas Co. hopes to have in operation by July 1st.

Work was begun at Edith St. and Maple Ave. F. E. Shaw Limited, Sarnia, has contracted to lay this part of the system which will tie into the main transmission line.

The transmission line will start about May 14th and will join the Niagara Gas transmission system at a metering station on the Third Line south of No. 5 Highway.

The company is employing as much local help as possible, and hopes to have natural gas available by the July 1st date, weather permitting. Pipe will be laid about two feet below the surface and according to company officials, the work schedule has been planned so as to cause as little inconvenience as possible.

The gas company is opening an office at 20 Main St. N., where McGowan's Specialty Shop was located.
