

First Polio Vaccine 7200 Halton Children

Chamber Will Decide On Shopping Campaign

Next Tuesday's meeting of Georgetown Chamber of Commerce will be of special interest to merchants.

A survey has been in progress among merchants to ascertain opinion on two types of campaigns to boost local shopping, and it is expected to have all results in and analyzed for this meeting.

A chairman for the retail division of the chamber will also be elected that night.

The board of directors met last Tuesday at North Halton golf club for dinner, and with chairman Harold Barstow planned the general meeting. Some time was spent discussing downtown parking, and opinion was that it is a matter which must be left more to merchants and property owners concerned, and the chamber cannot actively participate in a solution to congested traffic and lack of parking area.

The first phase of the polio immunization programme in Halton County came to a close on Friday when Dr. A. F. Bull, Medical Officer of Health, and assistants, visited the Fairview and Clarkesdale Schools in Nelson Township and Brantwood School, Oakville.

Over 7200 children who did not receive the vaccine last year were inoculated during the last three weeks.

All available vaccine has now been used, and a second dose will be given to the above group in about a month's time or when more vaccine is released.

It is hoped also that all those children vaccinated last year will receive their third dose before the end of the school year.

TWO BRDL EVENTS FOR BERNICE WILSON

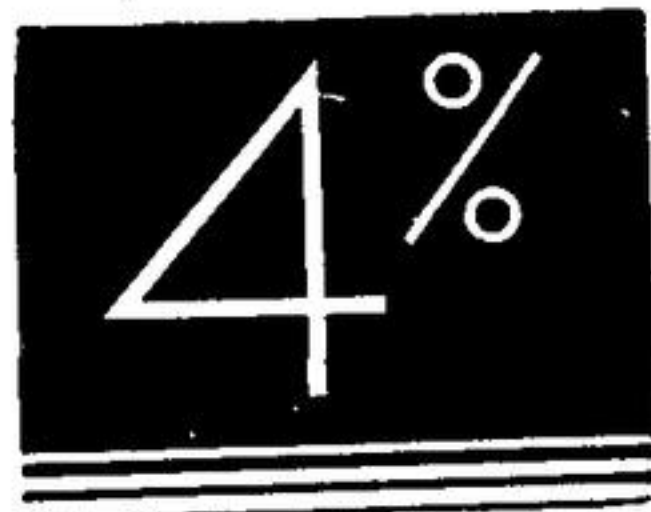
Two lovely events honoured Mrs. Alfred Leonard Williamson who was Bernice Wilson before their marriage Saturday in Ashgrove United Church.

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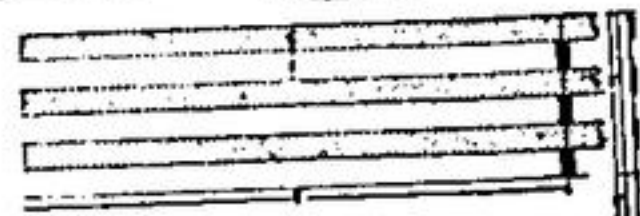
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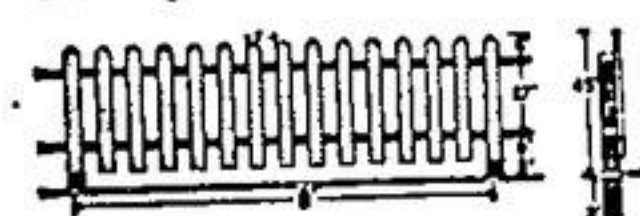

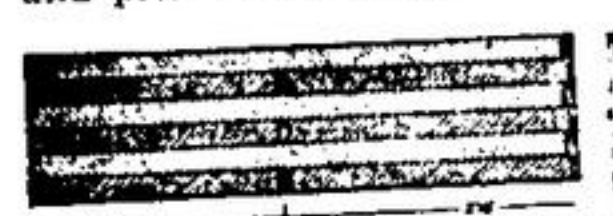


GOTHIC PICKET

BASKET WEAVE

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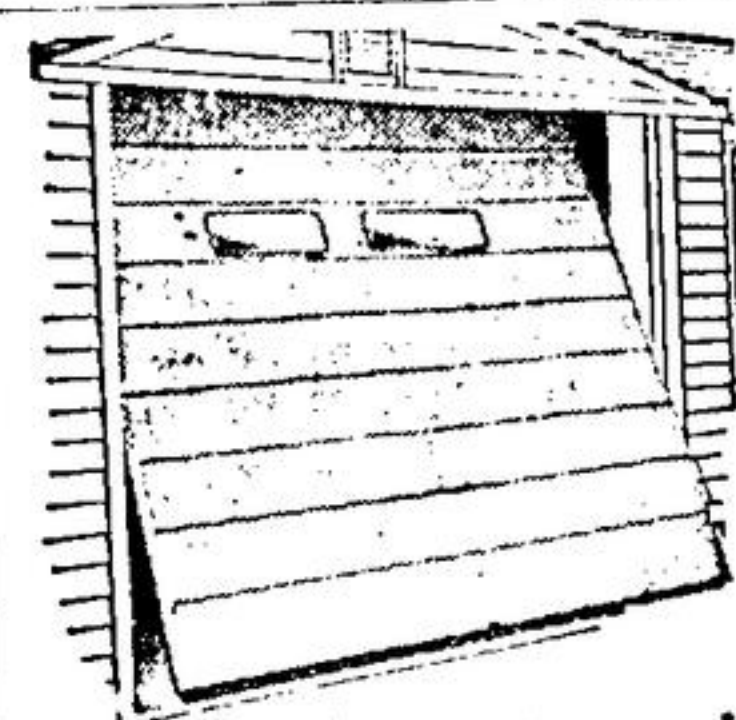

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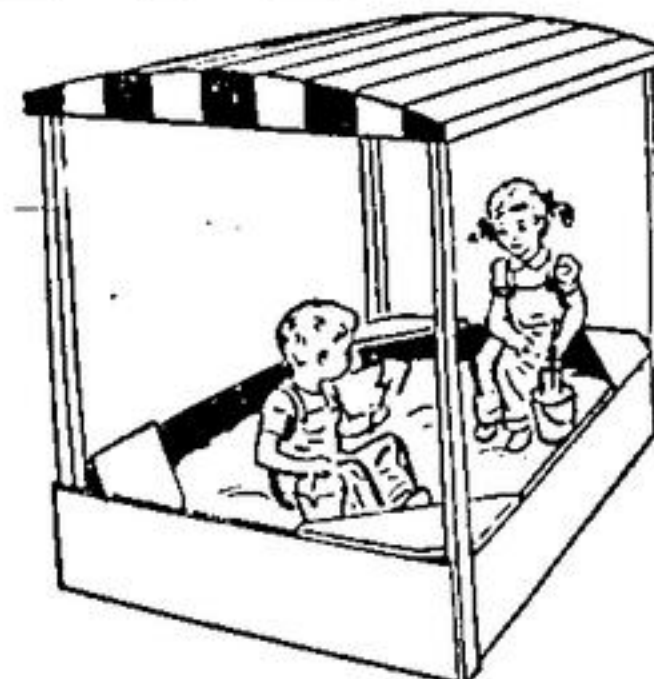
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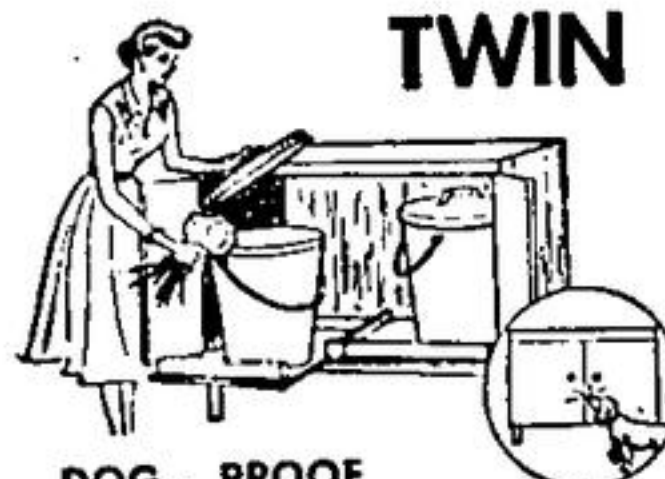
