Main Street. Increasing volume of traffic at both places is making traffic lights more and more necessary, and it is probable that some action will be taken this year to add this safety feature

to the town. Decision was deferred on action to open up Cherry St. which has been asked by a resident who is planning to build fronting on the street. Cr. Walter Gray reported that cost

of opening the street is estimated at

\$7300, exclusive of sewers. Council adopted the National Building Code, which together with the town's building by-law will govern local building laws until a zoning by-aw is adopted. In cases where the code and by-laws conflict,

Tenders were called for May 28th for a bridge over Silver Creek, necessary for the Maple Ave. extension which will link the two Maple avenues this summer.

Hamilton Excavating, one of five tenderers for the storm sewer which will relieve a bad drainage condition on King St., was awarded the contract for this work. Tender price is \$21,827.

W. H. Carr, land surveyor, was engaged to prepare a sketch of a possible public park area in the lower papermill region, which the town has been considering.

Mayor Armstrong reported that he, Mr. Carr, Cr. Alfred Sykes and Alex Maclaren, the town's representative on the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, had looked over the district that morning. Mr. Carr's sketch will determine who owns the land, and council may then interand at what prices.
